WHAT WOMEN WANT TO KNOW

To Strengthen Waist Muscles—Can you tell me of a simple exercise that will strengthen the muscles of my waist and also reduce its size?—Olivvia.

A good exercise for strengthening and at the same time decreasing the waist is to plant the feet somewhat apart, bend the upper part of the body backward as far as possible and then swing it around to the left, in front, to the right and back again. In coming to the front hold the waist muscles up and force the chest up, re the back again. Both these exercises are for the exact completely when swinging toward the waist and abdomen. They can be repeated from three to seven times if the subject is not easily fatigued, but if any strain is felt the exercise should not be repeated with as much vigor.

WHAT THE MARKET AFFORDS

Mrs. Wisely found her neighbor Mrs. Jack stirring an odd-looking mess in a big crock as she looked in this morning for an exchange of greetings. An inquiring look brought a quick response, "I'm trying my wings unaided; I remembered that you said Mr. Wisely didn't care for mushrooms, and that you didn't use them, so I thought I wouldn't bother you with a wholly foreign concern. Jack and I are still making our country excursions and he is a mushroom expert, you know. Well, we made a great deal the other day and brought home nearly half a bushel in the cart. We shared with our friends who do like mushrooms, but at least half were left. We are so fond of them that it seemed a pity to waste them, so I asked one of the mushroom club what I could do with them. She advised me not to try canning them, for, while it can be done successfully, it is a good deal of a trick, so she suggested that catsup was sure to be good and not hard to make. That struck me very favorably because I am very fond of it and it is quite a novelty, you know. She gave me her recipe, and as it is one for which your favorite authority, Table Talk, is responsible, I am going at my undertaking with full confidence. Mrs. Wisely looked over the printed directions with the eye of an expert. "That sounds first-rate and I know I should like it; I think I will try a little even if I have to eat it alone or only use it for company. I shall begin tomorrow, for I noticed that there were fine mushrooms in the market. They will never be cheaper nor better, for they are grown outdoors and have a richer flavor than the hot-house fungus. A few pounds will make several little bottles, and even at 50 cents a pound it will not be a bad investment. For the other housekeepers who want to try the mushroom delicacy here is the recipe: From large, thick mushroom caps trim off the stems quite short and cut into quarters with a silver knife. Arrange them in layers in a crock, sprinkling each layer thickly with salt. Cover and let stand in a cool place for three days, stirring thrice daily. On the fourth day, heat over a slow fire until scalding hot, wash to a pulp—or put thru the foodchopper—and strain thru coarse gauze, squeezing out every drop of juice. Heat quickly and boil uncovered for ten minutes; then measure. To each pint add one heaping teaspoonful of mixed peppercorns and whole allspice, one tablespoonful of finely cut onion, a small bay leaf, a small blade of mace and one-quarter of a teaspoonful of paprika or a dash of cayenne. Put all together over the fire and boil until quite thick; then strain, cool and bottle."
