MINNESOTA A JUDGMENT FOR WHEAT

CONSIGNEE OF STORED GRAIN HELD RESPONSIBLE IN THE CHARTER CASE AT REDWOOD FALLS.

Redwood Falls, Minn., Oct. 11.—Judge Weber has handed down a decision favorable to the plaintiff in the famous wheat storage case of Levi Charter and others against William J. Bettinigen & Co., giving Charter judgment for \$3,800, less the amount of a contract made in money at the price quoted on the day that Charter made a demand for the grain, less the amount charged for storage.

The case is of great interest to farmers all over Minnesota, by reason of the fact that the decision holds that the consignee of stored grain will be held responsible for the same in case the elevator owner or agent is unable to produce the grain or its value in dollars and cents.

The wheat was stored in the elevator of J. A. Engelhart, who owned the property up to Oct. 14, 1902, and Bettinigen & Co. were his Minneapolis consignees. On March 14, 1902, Engelhart transferred all of his elevator property here to Bettinigen, contending that an oral agreement had been made that Bettinigen was to pay all the outstanding storage tickets. Bettinigen denied this.

Judge Weber contends that the wheat was unlawfully shipped out of Engelhart's elevator and credited to Bettinigen, and that inasmuch as the law regards it as stolen property, Bettinigen must return the wheat or pay over to Charter the value of the wheat. He closes his opinion as follows:

"The grain of the warehouse receipts was an obligation on the part of Engelhart to deliver a certain quantity of wheat to the holder, and as Bettinigen had entered into a contract made for the benefit of the holder, if they elected to avail themselves of the contract, I think they are bound to return the wheat, or to make a demand upon Bettinigen, and if such demand was refused, the holder was entitled to recover the market value of the wheat at the time of the demand."




