## MICHIGAN CAMPAIGN OPENS IN PENNSYLVANIA

### U. S. SENATORS AND OTHERS TO HELP THE LOCAL MEN.

Nightly Meetings to Be Held in Houghton County, and General Apathy Put to Rout—District Is Safe for the National and State Republican Tickets.

Houghton, Mich., Oct. 18.—General Apathy, who has been in undisputed command of the campaign locally, was formally deposed last night, when the republicans began a campaign that will end only on Monday night before election, with truces on Sundays. Nightly meetings are to be held throughout the county, with the object of securing the election of a big republican majority, and the state is safe, undoubtedly, for the national ticket.

In addition to Senators Burrows and Alger, and candidates who are to speak here, Congressman Young is stumping the county, and other important speakers will be heard. Among the local men who will speak at numerous meetings are Senator Charles Smith, leader of the upper house of the state legislature; Robert H. Shriver, member of the state senate; George F. Hamblin, ex-state treasurer; Angus W. Kerr, formerly of the legislature and state tax commissioner; Dr. J. E. Scullion, member of the legislature; and J. C. Dunston, the local members of the lower house of the state legislature.

**NEWBERRY, MICH.**—A crop of 8,000 bushels of potatoes has been harvested at the state insane asylum. The tubers were grown on a tract of forty acres.

**ONTONAGON, MICH.**—A concern known as the Wyoming Cattle company has purchased a section of land in Matchwood township and commenced the erection of ranch buildings.

**MEMONINE, MICH.**—A prosperous concern of much value to the city is the local shoe factory, which gives employment to several hands. Shoes are being turned out at the rate of 200 pairs a day, and the business is expected to increase by 50 per cent. next year.

**ST. IGNACE, MICH.**—John Cary, deputy sheriff at Benton, Mackinac county, has been taken to the X-ray building. He is suffering from an injury to the arm, now reported to be serious, but attributed to a fall or a blow on the head.

**SAULT STE. MARIE, MICH.**—Adolph Laramie, aged 16, is charged, shot Viola Filtrault in a school yard in Sugar Island township. The girl is 16 and has a falling chance to live. A posse of men is in pursuit of Laramie.

**SAULT STE. MARIE, MICH.**—The Sault Ste. Marie (Ont.) Pulp and Paper company has decided to increase its production of paper. Machinery has been ordered and it is expected the new department will be in operation in thirty days.

**MANISTIQUE, MICH.**—The contractor has made a good start on the work of constructing the new station at Manistique Light and Power company. A foundation is being laid and when completed will leave a dry river bed and a new quarter mile of water. The rock then blasted and hoisted out will be utilized in the construction of the buildings.

### MANIA IN A TRAIN

Trainmen Prevent Him from Jumping Off Until a Station Is Reached.

**FORT DODGE, IOWA.**—Passengers on a Chicago Great Western passenger train experienced the excitement of riding with a maniac. The demented man was John McLean, who, with his mother, was on his way from Bedford, Mass., to San Francisco. He attracted special attention until the train reached a point west of Des Moines, when he suddenly sprang up and made an effort to jump off. It required the united efforts of military trainmen to keep him from getting away. A telegram sent to Hampton brought officers, who took charge of him. Mrs. McLean was attacked as she was getting out of her backdoor last night and choked into the street. The purpose of the man was evidently robbery, as the man made a search of her clothing. In the course of a few moments she came to sufficiently to crawl into the house and awaken her husband, who had retired for the night. A search by the police failed to find any trace of the man. "Mother" Peck, as she is familiarly known, was unable to give any description of her assailant.

**DUBUQUE, IOWA.**—The trustees of the German theological seminary of the northwest have decided to erect a new school building to cost \$100,000. The plans will be prepared this week.

**HUMBOLDT, IOWA.**—The Baptist church, which has been rebuilt, was dedicated Sunday. All other churches united with the Baptists in the exercises. The improvements represent an outlay of several thousand dollars, and the edifice is now modern thorough.

**MERKEL ESCAPES FOR NONCE**  
Jury in a Shooting Case at Bangor Disagrees.

**BANGOR, S. D.**—The case of the state vs. Joseph Merkel resulted in a disagreement of the jury. Merkel was charged with shooting Hugo Schwartz with intent to kill. The affray occurred some time in June, and Schwartz was first deprived of the jury stood seven for acquittal and five for conviction. ## MONTANA BROTHERS-IN-LAW FIGHT TO DEATH

### DRUNKEN DUEL IN A WESTERN STOCK CAMP.

Leman, a Wealthy Rancher, Who First Attacked with a Bowie Knife, Is Almost Instantly Killed by a Blow on the Head from the Butt of a Rifle.

Special to The Journal. Butte, Mont., Oct. 18.—Mail advices from Dillon, a small stock camp in Carbon county, tell of a drunken duel in which John Lemanox was killed by a blow on the head from the butt of a rifle in the hands of George Reed, his brother-in-law.

An argument arose between the two and Lemanox attacked Reed with a Bowie knife, severely cutting the latter's hands as the two struggled for possession of the weapon. Reed then drew a rifle and fired it into the air, finding a bullet hole in the man's head.

Reed then seized a rifle and, using it as a club, swung it with terrific force upon the head of Lemanox, who sank dying to the ground. Lemanox was a wealthy Snake river rancher.

**Comment's Death Mysterious.**  
While Charles Comment, a woolgrower, was riding to Jordan, he passed a camp, but saw but one man there, and he was apparently not Comment did not disturb him the same afternoon he was returning and passed the camp again, and saw the man lying in the same position, and thought it time to investigate, finding a bullet hole in the man's head.

There being no weapon about it, was evidently not a case of self-defense. Comment, it is disclosed that the man's name was Charles Comment, who it appears, had just separated from his wife after a quarrel.

Comment left Jordan with a friend named Farrant, who is now missing. Farrant later returned, trying to persuade Mrs. Comment to make up with her husband. She refused and Farrant then disappeared.

**N. P. Colonization Scheme.**

According to word received in this city last night, the Northern Pacific Railway company will not dispose of 2,000,000 acres of land in western Montana at auction, Oct. 20, owing, it is said, to an expected rise in prices. It is the company's intention, it is said, to begin a significant colonization scheme, the details of which have not yet been perfected. The auction would be probably the largest in the history of the company.

**Odd Fellows Meet.**  
The grand lodge of Odd Fellows convened this morning at 10 o'clock with D. J. Charles, grand master, in the church in the city. The grand encampment will convene. **\$15,500 Library Will Now Be Built at Fergus Falls.**

**FERGUS FALLS, MINN.**—The secretary of the local chapter of the Carnegie library has advised today to the effect that the donation for the proposed public library here had been increased to \$15,500. The donation is made conditional upon a proportionate increase in the state and city contributions of the library, which the city council has already agreed to. The increase was asked because the board desired to change its plans and erect a three-story building.

**GERMAN CATHOLICS LAY STONE**  
Exercises Preceded by a Long Parade Held at Belle Plaine.

**BELLE PLAINE, MINN.**—The cornerstone of the large new German Catholic church was laid in the presence of many hundred persons and visiting Catholic societies, who formed a long procession, which was led by the church band and marched into the city. The local business was assisted by others from neighboring parishes. The documents of the church in Latin, German and English and copies of various papers were read.

**WINONA TEACHERS COMING**  
About One Hundred to Visit Twin City Schools Next Week.

**WINONA, MINN.**—At a meeting of the teachers of the Winona public schools, it was decided to take a trip to the twin cities to inspect the schools of that city. The trip will be made on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The board of education decided to close the Winona schools for two days to allow the teachers to make the trip. About 90 per cent of them went. This number is assured. The railway has made the trip to be planned down some six thousand large trout from those hatched out in that city. It is hoped that these fish will do better than the smaller trout fry brought here earlier in the season.

**DEATH OF MRS. LARPELLEUR**  
Old Resident of Hastings Will Be Buried Tomorrow.

**HASTINGS, MINN.**—Mrs. F. B. Larpelleur died yesterday afternoon after a brief illness, aged 66. She was an old resident of this city and was universally esteemed. A husband and three daughters—Mrs. C. W. King, Mrs. Horatia L. Rayler and Mrs. E. J. King—survive her. The funeral will be held from the home tomorrow at 4 p. m. Rev. Archibald Durie officiating.


**EDWIN A. GRANT IS DEAD**  
One of Fargo's First Settlers and Long Its Postmaster.

**FARGO, N. D.**—A letter was received today bearing news of the death of Edwin A. Grant in California. He was among the first settlers of Fargo and was postmaster for a long time. He was a civil war veteran as a member of the One Hundred and Ninety-sixth Ohio volunteers.
