DUNN TRIES TO STRIKE BACK

CANDIDATE IS ENRAGED BY ATTITUDE OF TRAVELING MEN.

Greatest Rally in the History of Todd County Held at Long Prairie Last Night for Johnson and Winston—Various Other Meetings Thruout the State.

Jackson, Minn., Oct. 21.—In his address here last night R. C. Dunn criticized John A. Johnson's speeches on the drainage of state swamp lands and after pleading vigorously for the 4 per cent gross earnings bill, said: "I am called the 'railroad candidate.' Do you believe any railroad president ever asked me to champion a measure which adds \$700,000 to the railroad taxes?"

Mr. Dunn referred to a number of traveling men who are "systematically knocking" him because as auditor he raised the assessments of their employers.

"Let them knock," said he. "If they wish to raise the issue in this state between the taxpayer and the taxpayer I am willing to risk my chances on the side of the people."

Congressman Stevens said the democrats were trying to steal a march on the republicans of Minnesota by using fascinating disguises which conceal their real purpose. He paid a high tribute to Mr. Dunn.

On the way from Winnebago City to Jackson the candidates were given hearty greetings at Fairmont and Sherburne.

The meeting at Winnebago City was held in the afternoon and was well attended.

LONG PRAIRIE'S BEST MEETING

Johnson and Winston Rally Attracts Tremendous Crowd.

Long Prairie, Minn., Oct. 21.—The largest and most enthusiastic political gathering of the season was held in Long Prairie last night when John A. Johnson here last night.

Every inch of standing room was taken. The speakers stood against the walls four and six deep and chairs were carried into the room until the speakers themselves were even crowded.

The two adjoining juryrooms were thrown open and scores stood during the entire meeting, many of them being unable to see the speakers at all. Even the Dunn boomers here admit, reluctantly, that the Johnson and Winston meeting was the greatest political demonstration ever held in Todd county.

Dunn's followers here are claiming Dunn will have a majority of 150 in the county, while the same men declare Roosevelt will have from 800 to 1,000 majority.

Conservative democrats and leading republicans who have repudiated Dunn say Johnson and Winston will carry Todd county by from 200 to 300.

Other State Meetings.

Albert Lea, Minn., Oct. 21.—John L. Gibbs spoke here yesterday, urging his old neighbors to vote for Robert C. Dunn for governor.

Perkasie, Minn., Oct. 21.—The republican campaign was opened here last night with a rousing rally at the Lyceum theater, an address being made by Dr. S. H. Hanks.

Hanska, Minn., Oct. 21.—A republican meeting here last night was addressed by General H. W. Childs, George H. Edgerly, Charles N. Orr, Royall, Minn., Oct. 21.—In his address last evening, Senator Clapp only presented the republican cause on national issues. He was most enthusiastically received.

Pelican Rapids, Minn., Oct. 21.—Congressman Stearns addressed the republican cause in this city last evening. The anti-Dunn sentiment seems to be in evidence here.

JOHNSON GAINING

Fine Rally Held at Hinckley on Short Notice.

Hinckley, Minn., Oct. 21.—A John A. Johnson rally was held here last night. Addresses were made by Edward Peterson and others. The Hinckley band furnished music. Although this meeting was hastily arranged, a large and enthusiastic crowd was in attendance. Every mention of Johnson's name provoked prolonged applause. A large percentage of those present were republicans, most of whom will vote for Johnson. The anti-Dunn feeling here among republicans is growing. Many who have heretofore declared they would try to swallow Dunn are now outspoken for Johnson.

Not a Cheer for "Bob."

Wayzata, Minn., Oct. 21.—A republican rally, held last night at the new village hall, was largely a success. Among the speakers were Deputy Sheriff Wall, County Commissioner Andrew J. Smith, Mr. Nolan and C. L. Smith. A rhetorical climax, "and don't forget to vote for good, honest, homely old Bob Dunn," plainly intended to produce a burst of applause, was received in silence. This village is 90 per cent republican, but Johnson and Winston will carry the day.

Prohibitionists Speak.

Madison, Minn., Oct. 21.—A prohibition rally was held at the city hall last evening. The speakers were W. W. Dorsett, candidate for governor, and Editor George F. Wells of Backbone. Professor Lokenburg of the Lutheran normal school, assisted. The speakers urged the enemies of the saloon in all parties to unite in the prohibition party, especially in view of the absence of other issues this year. It is believed that some anti-Dunn republicans will vote for Mr. Dorsett.

Dunn Meeting at Triumph.

Triumph, Minn., Oct. 21.—A republican rally was held here last night. Saturday night in the interests of R. C. Dunn, evidently to offset the favorable impression made by John A. Johnson.
