

DUNN TRIES TO STRIKE BACK

CANDIDATE IS ENRAGED BY ATTI-TUDE OF TRAVELING MEN.

Greatest Rally in the History of Todd County Held at Long Prairie Last Night for Johnson and Winston-Various Other Meetings Thruout the

Jackson, Minn., Oct. 21.—In his address here last night R. C. Dunn criticized John A. Johnson's speeches on the drainage of state swamp lands and after pleading vigorously for the 4 per

cent gross earnings bill, said:

"I am called the 'railroad candidate.' Do you believe any railroad president ever asked me to champion a measure which adds \$700,000 to the railroad taxes?"

Mr. Dunn referred to a number of traveling men who are "systematically knocking" him because as auditor he raised the assessments of their employ-

"Let them knock," said he. "If they wish to raise the issue in this state between the taxpayer and the tax dodger I am willing to risk my chances on the side of the people."

Congressman Stevens said the demograts were trying to steel a morning. Congressman Stevens said the democrats were trying to steal a march on the republicans of Minnesota by using fascinating disguises which conceal their real purpose. He paid a high tribute to Mr. Dunn.

LONG PRAIRIE'S BEST MEETING Johnson and Winston Rally Attracts Tremendous Crowd.

Long Prairie, Minn., Oct. 21.—The largest and most enthusiastic political gathering that has ever assembled in Long Prairie greeted John A. Johnson here last night.

Every inch of standingroom was taken. The people stood up against the walls four and six deep and chairs were carried into the room until the speakers themselves were even crowded.

The two adjoining juryrooms were thrown open and scores stood during the entire meeting, many of them being unable to see the speakers at all. Even the Dunn boomers here admit, reluctantly, that the Johnson and Winston meeting was the greatest political demonstration ever held in Todd county.
