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TWENTY-FIRST OFF FOR PHILIPPINES

EIGHT COMPANIES BID FAREWELL TO FORT SNELLING.

Hundreds of People on Hand to Bid Goodby to the Boys and Wish Them Bon Voyage—Regiment to Embark at San Francisco for the Islands.

The Twenty-first infantry marched out of Fort Snelling this afternoon to the tune of "The Girl I Left Behind Me." After saluting the stars and stripes in front of the old administration building, the eight companies, amidst the booming of cannon, started on their journey with the regiment to the Philippines.

Great regret was expressed both by the soldiers and their friends at the departure of the regiment, and early in the afternoon a large crowd gathered on the parade grounds bidding goodby and "God speed." The troops were carried by electric cars to the St. Paul Union station, where another large crowd awaited them.

ALTHOUGH the past three days have been busy ones and the huge caravans of army wagons have been working night and day and the inventory of the post property has been taken, the regiment considered itself the Fort Snelling contingent until the bugle call at 3 o'clock. At that moment they were in the Philippine service. Ten minutes later the bugle call was given before each of the company quarters and at 3:15 there were the adjutant's orders to fall in.

THE OMAHA road carries the troops as far as Omaha, and from there they will proceed to Denver and from Denver to San Francisco. Other companies from Fort Keogh, Mont., and Fort Lincoln, N. D., will arrive in San Francisco about the same time as the Fort Snelling companies, which will probably depart Friday or Saturday. Two weeks later the regiment sails for the Philippines.

Many of the men are willing to go into the Philippine service and consider it an opportunity rather than an obnoxious order. Nevertheless, the men were sorry to bid goodby to the friends of the regiment, and many would not be forgotten were often touching.

THE HOSPITAL corps remains at the fort, as it is thought that the soldiers have been thoroughly trained in first aid to the injured, and that the trip to the coast will not require the presence of medical attendants. Nevertheless, Major Stephenson of New York and Major Kiersted of Fort Meyer, Wash., both of the hospital department of the army, accompany the troops and can be called on if medical attendance is necessary.
