VARIED OPINION OF THE "DOPES"

Chicago Luminaries Twinkle with Multi-hued Radiance on Saturday's Showings.

Chicago, Oct. 31.—Tribune—The surprising strength of Illinois and Nebraska, the unexpected weakness of Wisconsin and the poor showing of Chicago and Minnesota constitute the unexpected features brought out in the west. After three championship contests there were surprises galore, the results in all the games being widely different from predictions that could have been made from the previous showings of the eleven engaged. The result of the game at Madison shows nearly the relative strength of the ladder's "volunteers."

The Minnesota-Nebraska game was perhaps as surprising as either of the two big contests. Since its defeat at the hands of Colorado three weeks ago the cornhuskers, while playing consistently good ball, have not shown signs of unusual strength. Minnesota, on the other hand, has been overwhelming all opponents, and before the game looked like a winner by a large score. The gophers have suffered by not having played any interclass games before Saturday, however, while the Colorado game had proved a good experience for its opponents.

Records of the other western football championship aspirant was put among the discarded Saturday when Michigan administered to Wisconsin the worst beating the badger ever received. Saturday's results leave four undefeated teams in the west, Michigan, Chicago, Minnesota and Illinois.

The last two have no engagements that can give them much prestige in winning a championship, neither being scheduled to meet a prominent team that has not already met defeat.

Out of the tangled web come four facts of especial interest to western football enthusiasts: the tremendous strength of the Michigan team, the failure of the Wisconsin coaches to build up a creditable team, Nebraska's ability to score on the giant Minnesota team, the in-and-out playing of Chicago.

Michigan today stands out above all her opponents of western gridiron honors, and the team which Coach Yost sent against the badgers gives promise of being the most powerful machine ever constructed, and one which, if coached as effectively and defensively, which that coach has ever constructed.

Chicago—With Wisconsin decisively beaten by Michigan and Chicago held to a tie by Illinois, it became a question Saturday whether the championship contests will result this year very much as they did last year—with Michigan and Minnesota claiming the premier position. There is a chance that the western and eastern will meet, but it is a most remote one.

On the comparative showings Saturday Michigan seems to have the call over Minnesota, the latter having barely beaten Nebraska.

The most surprising feature of this contest was the demonstration that Illinois does not have the "machine" he is supposed to have had in the past. Michigan's aggression worked like anything but a machine, and the result was a work of a high class. As far as offense is concerned, Heaton appeared to be about half of the team, and with a player of the ability of any other of the backs in his place, the Michigan contest might have gone the other way.

Inter-collegiate—Alto Minnesota had a hard time winning from Nebraska, they look much better than Wisconsin and Chicago.

AFTER THE BATTLES

How the Teams Came Thru the Struggles of Saturday.

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 31.—Harvard felt blue yesterday as a result of Saturday's defeat. There is a strong feeling of resentment against the coaches who, it is claimed, are largely responsible for Harvard's defeat.

Ithaca, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Not at all discouraged by the victory of Cornell over Michigan and his Cornell football team will immediately begin preparation for the game with Columbia in New York city on Nov. 12. Only one man was injured in Saturday's battle, Right End Forgy, who damaged his knee.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Oct. 31.—The third and greatest celebration of Michigan's victory occurred in Ann Arbor Saturday night. Yost and the two Hammond boys stayed in Chicago.

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 31.—The game was in good condition. Not a man has a bruise that will keep him out of the game more than a day or two. Bloomer will be given a rest in order to let up on his lams shoulder. One or two of the other players will be kept out of the hard work.

Princeton, N. J., Oct. 31.—Princeton undergraduates, while fairly well satisfied as to the number of points made against Cornell, were amazed because the linemen worked the tigers down the field by straight football for a touchdown in the first ten minutes of the game. The next two weeks of work will be devoted to the defense problem.

New York, Oct. 31.—Captain Stangland of the Columbia eleven was badly injured in the Yale game that he will not be able to play again this season. The other members of the team, with two or three exceptions, are all battered and bruised.

RACE NARROWS BETWEEN HIGHS

Central Due for Hard Coaching—St. Thomas' Performances Call Forth Praise.

High-school interest is focused on Central, and everyone is asking if Central can recover itself and, in the final game with North Side, administer a stinging defeat and wrest the laurels from the so far undefeated team. The basis of the question lies in the fine form shown in the game against East. At certain stages when the machinery worked together and the carefully planned plays were not forgotten. When the Central team meets North high next week, they will be veterans, and the greenness ought to be a past quality. The week spots shown up will be the center of the coaching in the next three weeks, and the mention that all the central alumni will be out in force is unnecessary.

North will not be caught napping, and, at the same time, they do not express any strong fears and look for a close game. The game with Hamline shows that they are coming, and that their defense can be relied upon at critical times. The defeat of Hamline, which stands second in the intercollegiate league, and the defeat of St. Thomas early in the season would prove that the inter-high-collegiate championship, if there was such an organization between the colleges and the high schools.

As an aftermath of the East-Central game, the boys are all talking of the ruling made after Frykman had made his fair catch, by which the Central players were allowed to line up within five yards apart. Fortunately, the outcome of the game did not depend on the kick, and the discussion of the rules was merely a friendly desire to know what was right.

One of the striking features of the North high-Hamline game was the kicking of Marks, who got his points off with remarkable speed, and in two instances got the ball over the opposing team's last man. North's speedy ends were down the field like a shot, and in most cases dropped the ball on the line. Marks was the best kicking of the year for the North team, and if Frykman had had the quick kick on the first drive it would have been a good guess.

Central's game with St. Paul Central will be watched with interest, and it is expected that the Minnesota school will put up a strong showing. If the game is won by the Minneapolis Central team, the twin city championship rests in Minneapolis.

St. Thomas Good.
St. Thomas is now the undisputed champion of the intercollegiate league, having clinched the title by the victory over Shattuck Saturday by a score of 11 to 0. The saints have won all the intercollegiate games with ease, and made a good showing against the "Y."

Both teams in the Farhault game suffered from the heat, which showed its effect in the play of the teams in the second half. About 700 spectators cheered the Shattuck boys who played a consistent game against odds. The feature of the game was the run made by Diamond for Shattuck, who caught the ball on the kickoff on his 10-yard line and ran the length of the field for touchdown. For St. Thomas, the backfield played fine football and the line men were strong on defense and opened up good holes. For Shattuck, Diamond, Capron, Welch and Wilkinson were the stars. St. Thomas made its touchdowns by short rushes.
