**ROMANCE ALL GONE FROM POI**

HAWAIIAN DISH A VICTIM OF THE COMMERCIAL AGE.

C. N. Looftad, Who Represents a Former Minneapolis Man's Company in the Islands, Tells of Rapid Progress Made There—Some Ways in Which American Residents Suffer.

It costs a passenger \$200 more to come from Honolulu to San Francisco in a foreign steamer than in an American vessel. The \$200 is a federal fine. This is one of the conditions which C. N. Looftad, the Hawaiian islands quotes as militating against the interests of Uncle Sam's people in this dependency.

The same rules are applied to freight. The marine law extended to the islands forbids the carrying of passengers between American ports by foreign vessels. So a citizen of the United States anxious to get home would have to throw away \$200 or permit a foreign steamer to sail without him and wait for an American steamer a week later.

Mr. Looftad, who was the guest of W. M. Horner at the Commercial club today, had other interesting things to tell. Although the main product of the islands is sugar, the planter who uses it in his coffee must import the refined article from the United States. They don't refine it in Hawaii. Poi, which used to be the national dish, and the eating of which was always a "stunt" for tourists, is no longer ground in calabash with a pestle, but ground by machinery, and handed over the grocery counter like any other article of commerce.

Sugar plantations have their own soda water factories, for the Japanese laborers consume immense amounts of the carbonated water. One can order sundries and fancy drinks in the city, just as they do in the States.

In fact, Honolulu is up to date. It has electric street cars, and transfers, and three of the most modern hotels.

The natives have yielded to the Americans and English in commercial affairs. Business is done on a big scale. Some of the sugar plantations are capitalized at \$5,000,000. One has seventy-five miles of industrial railroad with oil-burning locomotives. The systems of irrigation cost immense sums. One plantation has a pumping capacity of 90,000,000 gallons of water a day. Another plantation brings water from the mountains thru tunnels and over valleys. Flooding is done by steam.

The Japanese are excellent laborers. They live well, are furnished houses, firewood and medical attendance, and are able to send home thousands of dollars annually.

Mr. Looftad left Minneapolis about eighteen months ago, and is with the Greig company (Ltd.) of Newburg, N. Y., which manufactures portable tracks, cane cars, cane car unloaders invented by William C. Gregg, until recently of Minneapolis. He is on his way across the country.

**DENOUNCES SERAPHIM**

Minneapolis Priest Says He Has No Standing in the Church.

Father Popoff, of the Minneapolis Russian Greek church, was acquainted with Father Seraphim, the bishop mobbed by his congregation in Winnipeg, last Sunday.

"Seraphim," said Father Popoff this morning, "was excommunicated in Russia, several years ago. He was a heavy drinker, and was expelled from the priesthood. After traveling thru Italy, Africa and Palestine, he appeared in Constantinople, where he claimed to be a bishop. From there he came to Winnipeg, where he again claimed that office."

The bishop of the Greek church in Constantinople sent a notice as to his status to Winnipeg, and the mobbing was the result of the disclosure of his imposture. I saw him about two months ago in Winnipeg, where he was acting as bishop. He has absolutely no standing in the Greek church."

**WILL SPEND MILLIONS**

NEW INCORPORATION PLANNING BIG IMPROVEMENTS IN RAINY RIVER DISTRICT.

Millions will be spent in the International Falls territory by the Rainy River Improvement association, backed by Minneapolis capital, which filed articles of incorporation yesterday with \$5,000,000 capital.

The company is to build a \$300,000 concrete dam across Rainy river to raise the level in the lake and furnish more power. It will build a flour and paper mill on the Canadian side and a saw and paper mill on the American side. The completed dam is expected to furnish 30,000 horse power. To further operations Kabetogama and Memakan lakes will be connected by canal.

The incorporators are E. W. Backus, A. E. Horr, R. L. Horr, G. L. Rockwood of Minneapolis and H. B. Winchell of Butte.
