FOOTBALL SEASON WAS PROFITABLE

Gopher Ledger Will Show About \$10,000 to the Good.

There the games are being fought over, and every inch of ground contested to the last argument. The team has been swallowed up by the student body and only the talk remains.

Big Dan Smith was the only man injured in the Iowa game. Some enthusiastic hawkers jumped into the anatomy of the petite Daniel and cracked a rib for him. It is not serious, but the lad from New California is not performing any stunts on the horizontal bar just at present.

Up in the business office at the gymnasium, Manager Frank Reed is counting out the contents of the strong box, and as near as can be approximated Minnesota finished the season with from \$10,000 to \$12,000 on the right side of the ledger. Had the Northwestern and Iowa games been played in Minneapolis, the fountain-head of western football enthusiasm, the receipts would have been larger. Iowa's crowd was small as compared with what it should have been. Minnesota not only helped herself, but helped Wisconsin as well. From Madison comes the word that the old badger debt has been wiped out, and the athletic ledger shows \$4,000 to the good. This is a testimonial to Kilpatrick. When he took charge of the badger affairs, there was a heavy debt. He has been successful in clearing this up, and is leaving the school in good financial shape so far as athletics are concerned.

From a business standpoint, it looks as if the Wisconsin was making a mistake in allowing Kilpatrick to leave. He goes to a Chicago sporting goods house on Jan. 1.

WISCONSIN WANTS McCORNAOK

Northwestern's Clever Coach Regarded Favorably by Badgers.

Madison, Wis., Nov. 30.—It is being talked here that Wisconsin authorities are "feeling out" Coach Wally McCormack of Northwestern with a view of making him a definite offer to succeed the late Professor Silchester as faculty supervisor of athletics and has a veto power over all contracts and other engagements of the student athletic association.

From Madison comes the word that the determination is abroad to divorce the athletic association from faculty control. How this can be done is exceedingly doubtful, and it seems, in fact, impossible.

McCormack is strongly favored among the alumni of the varsity here and pressure is being brought to find out how to sever his connection with Northwestern.

McCormack's Position.

Chicago, Nov. 30.—Walter McCormack said today: "I am going up to Madison tonight, but not on any football business whatever. I have received some informal letters from football men, but no authorized offer has been made. I have another year's contract with Northwestern and will coach there or nowhere. It is near to my home, and I want to stay there until I can solve the toughest proposition in football—that of giving them a winner."

"Northwestern has backed me to its fullest capacity, and that capacity is growing."

COVERED RINK FOR HOCKEY PLAY

Harriet Hockey and Athletic Club Ready to Begin Its Season.

At a meeting held last night, the final plans of the Harriet Hockey and Athletic club were canvassed and completed. A covered rink is now assured. The site has not been finally decided upon, but it is thought that the rink will be located on Lake street near Hennepin avenue. It will be enclosed entirely and covered. One side will be used for practice and championship play. On the other will be seats to accommodate 500 to 1,000 spectators, a warming room and the lockers. Still more room will be left for straight skating.

The hockey rink will be under the care of an experienced keeper. It is expected that the following clubs will join the league: Lakeshore, Glen, Mohawk, Harriet, Central, East and South Highs, and the Iroquois. The players on each team will be assessed \$2 each, this sum entitling them to a season's entrance to the rink for practice and championship play. The teams will play for a championship cup.
