Substitution for It of a Popular Song Tends to Prove That the Institution Is No Longer in Line With Better Baptist Sentiment, Says Rev. W. B. Riley.

Baptist ministers of Minneapolis are deeply pained to learn that Chicago university, commonly classed as a Baptist institution, has decided to substitute a popular song in place of the doxology in chapel exercises.

The recommendation that a popular song be substituted for the famous hymn came from the junior college council, which argued that the change would awaken enthusiasm in the chapel exercises.

"I discredited the whole article, not believing it possible that the university had taken such a step," said Rev. W. B. Riley, today.



Mr. Kerkhoff Tells How Independent Companies View It. Although the tendency of the times is to consolidate all the independent telephone companies under one parent organization, it is not probable, according to W. M. Kerkhoff, treasurer of the Twin City Telephone company, that the \$700,000,000 trust, should it be formed, would prevent the independent company from manufacturing its own supplies. He said: "We could manufacture everything needed here if necessary, and could not be brought under the domination of any trust of the kind mentioned in the press dispatches."

They Will Be Taught How to Judge Cattle and Grain. The farmers' course in score card judging of livestock and grain will begin Tuesday, Jan. 10, in the new livestock pavilion at the school of agriculture, St. Anthony Park, and will continue for two weeks. The course is given for the benefit of the farmers of the state and is open to all who desire to attend. No entrance examinations are required and no age limit is prescribed. The pavilion will seat a thousand people comfortably, and a splendid equipment of stock insures a valuable course of instruction to the farmers in attendance. The work will be a combination of score card and comparative judging, demonstration lectures and practical object lessons in livestock management, and in handling farm meats.
