MOORHEAD EDUCATOR HONORED BY TEACHERS OF STATE.

New Election Plan Gave a Decisive Result Without the Necessity of a Second Formal Ballot—Separate Training School for Incurable Girls Is Discussed and Formally Indorsed.

The result of the new electoral method adopted by the Minnesota Educational association was quite a surprise, the primary ballot yesterday resulting in an election for all of the offices. It had been provided that any person securing a majority of all votes cast for an office should be considered elected. Where no such majority was secured, all persons having 20 per cent of the votes should have their names placed on the formal ballot. It was expected that usually a formal ballot would be necessary, but it was not required this year. Many members of the association did not know of the changed plan and did not vote yesterday.

Frank A. Weld, president of the Moorhead normal school, was elected president by a vote of 205, the other candidates being C. H. Cooper of Mankato normal and C. M. Jordan of Minneapolis. For recording secretary

NEW MYSTERY IN TALBOT SCANDAL

Signers of Irvine Plea Against Bishop Repudiate Their Signatures.

New York, Dec. 30.—Churchmen interested in the charges presented against Bishop Talbot have been considerably wrought up over the dispatches from Huntingdon, Pa., announcing that presenters living there whose names were affixed to the charges have repudiated their signatures.

A conference was called and the new aspect of affairs was discussed. Dr. Irvine was called up over the long-distance telephone and the conversation is said to have been exciting. Herbert Noble, principal counsel for the presenters, said that he was surprised to hear that they now wish to recall their action. I doubt, however if there will be any delay in consequence.

I refused to give out the names of the men who signed the presentation, on the ground that it might defeat the ends of justice to make their names public at this time. The names were obtained, however, from some source, and were published. Now we are informed that five of the signers repudiate their signatures. Their action will not block the inquiry. If it causes delay it will be short, as it will not be necessary to start all over again. I am not sufficiently informed as to the position of the signers to say just what will be done in view of their attitude.

One Signer Repudiates.

Huntingdon, Pa., Dec. 30.—The controversy between Bishop Talbot and Rev. Dr. Ingram N. W. Irvine assumed a sensational phase today when John Langdon denied having placed his signature to the presentation which contains the specifications against the prelate.

Mr. Langdon says: I did not place my name to any such document, neither have I seen it. I have been grossly misrepresented in this case, and if I have become one of the central figures in the scandal I unwillingly have been led into it. I will not deny having signed a paper, but it was in the form of a private communication addressed to Right Rev. O. C. Tuttle, bishop of Kentucky, asking that the Talbot-Irvine case be forever stilled. The communication was limited to about twenty words and was signed by the five male communicants of St. John's church mentioned, together with my own. The communication was brought to my room by Vestryman G. W. Miller, who is also a presenter, and as it was signed by the others of the vestry I did not hesitate to place my name to it, at Mr. Miller's request.

While Dr. Irvine was rector of St. John's he and Mr. Miller and Mr. Denthorne were very friendly. I do not know that Mr. Miller ever had any direct communication with Dr. Irvine, neither do I know how my name became attached to the presentation.

WILL VOTE FOR THE BILL

Letter from Senator Clapp Read at Winona Meeting.

Winona, Minn., Dec. 30.—At a meeting of Winona manufacturers and business men last evening, the aims sought by the Minnesota Receivers and Shippers' association were presented by George S. Loftus and E. J. Gannon, commissioner of the association. Support for the Cooper-Quarles bill and indorsement for the reciprocal demurrage bill it is proposed to bring before the legislature were urged, but the meeting took no action. In the course of his remarks Mr. Gannon read a letter under date of Dec. 27 from Moses E. Clapp, in which the senator pledged his best efforts to secure the passage of the Cooper-Quarles bill.
