TO REMOVE THE CARES OF TRAVEL

NEW YORK CENTRAL LINES TO HAVE LOCAL OFFICE.

Realizing the Importance of Caring for the Northwestern Passengers Who Are Eastbound, Eastern Road Plans Bureau of Information and Minneapolis Ticket Office on Nicollet Avenue.

For the accommodation of northwestern travelers over its system, the New York Central lines will open a ticket office and travel bureau in Minneapolis Feb. 1. Frank L. Towne, now of the Northern Pacific city office, will be the city ticket agent, and W. L. Wynn, northwestern passenger agent of the Michigan Central, and W. B. Hunter, northwestern passenger agent of the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern, will divide their time between the two cities.

Arrangements have been completed by W. B. Jerome, general agent of the New York Central lines at Chicago, for a lease of office room in the new railway building at Nicollet avenue and Third street. It will place all information concerning resorts on the Central line within easy reach of all possible patrons to leave Minneapolis secure in the knowledge that all details of tickets, sleeping car reservations, and baggage have been attended to at the beginning of the journey.

The New York Central system will thus be able to relieve the city ticket offices of the Chicago lines of detail work and will make the range of information wider and facilities more complete. The New York Central lines' office will furnish applicants tickets to Chicago over either of the seven Chicago lines.
