LAW'S GRASP ON SANTA FE ROAD

Continued from First Page.

stand assumed full responsibility for the rebates. In no way is the president of the company, E. P. Ripley, or the former vice president, Ed. Morton, now secretary of the navy, officially involved. The prosecution, when commenced, will be directed against the Santa Fe corporation for the collection of heavy fines. Mr. Biddle, by his statements on the witness stand has rendered himself immune, for a section in the Elkins law protects him from all harm.

Laws Broken, Court Defied.

According to the testimony before the interstate commerce commission, the Santa Fe road has wilfully violated two statutes and an injunction of the federal court. It has violated the original interstate commerce act, which prohibits rebates of the character referred to, as well as the Elkins act, which is a later and more drastic statement of the original act. Two years ago an injunction was secured against the Santa Fe road for the violation of the law, by which it was forbidden to engage in rebate giving, and that injunction has been violated.

The prosecution will be under the Elkins act, because it is the latest statutory expression on the rebate question, and because, further, its penalties are more severe than those of the original act.

The rebates complained of were paid for a period of five years, ending last month, and it will be possible to fine the Santa Fe company from \$1,000 to \$20,000 for each separate violation. The road, therefore, has a good deal at stake, for a strict enforcement of the law, applied to all its rebate payments to the Colorado Fuel & Iron company for five years, would make a tremendous hole in its surplus capital.

Moody to Use Best Efforts.

It is said to be the intention of the government to proceed against the company with all the energy at its command. The president takes an active interest in the case, because it strikingly illustrates the argument, he is now making for legislation which will bring the great carrying companies under better control. He had an interview a number of weeks ago with a high official of the Caledonian company, which was being gradually bankrupted by the Santa Fe's system of rebates to the Colorado Fuel & Iron company, and under his direction secret-service men were sent into the separate violation. It is said that these men secured documentary evidence of a highly important character, which will be used by the attorney general in the prosecution of the case.

Santa Fe Tried to Buy.

Neill B. Field, one of the officials of the Caledonian company, is in Washington to look after the case. It is understood that the Santa Fe company offered to purchase the Caledonian company at a high figure, to stop further investigations, but Mr. Field declined to consider the offer, preferring to do nothing that would cripple the arm of the government in its proposed prosecution.

Public sentiment is pretty evenly divided on the question of whether Secretary Morton's former vice president of the Santa Fe, and in that capacity in official charge of all its traffic affairs, has had any guilty knowledge of the violation of the law. On the surface of the case, he is guiltless, for full responsibility for all that was done has been assumed by Mr. Biddle, who was Mr. Morton's executive agent.

The rebate transaction, however, was a large one, involving heavy shipments and the collection of vast sums for freight. That Mr. Biddle, on his own motion, without consulting his chief, would dare proceed to an open and long continued violation of the law, is questioned in many quarters; yet there is nothing in the record involving Mr. Morton, and he is not a party to the present case in any way.

The case was originally heard by the interstate commerce commission in the southwest last fall, and there was an adjourned hearing in Chicago. These hearings brought out the testimony on which the commission is soon to make its report. The testimony and report, with the documentary proof secured by the secret service men, will be at the disposal of the department of justice. The fact that Mr. Morton is now in

DEADLY SCOURGES IN CANAL ZONE

Yellow Fever and Smallpox on the Isthmus Prove Commission Fails.

New York Sun Special Service.

New York, Jan. 19.—A dozen persons arrived from Panama today on the steamer Segurancas, fleeing from the pestilential, malarial canal zone, infested by yellow fever and threatened by smallpox. They sailed from Colon. These statements and admissions are startling evidence that the canal commission and the sanitary department have not cleaned up the zone, as promised; that yellow fever, smallpox or some other malignant disease promises to become epidemic.

Those who arrived today had heard of no smallpox on the isthmus, but reported that there was yellow fever at Panama. W. P. Armstrong of Washington, auditor of the Panama commission, was one of the passengers. He remained on the isthmus but one week. Mr. Armstrong said he had seen all he could in a week on the isthmus. He was asked if it was true that the canal was a death ditch; that the laborers were miserably paid and harassed by disease; that suspected cases of yellow fever are taken to the hospital daily; that there would be a revolution today if it was not for the presence of American warships, and that all the correspondents on the isthmus are subsidized.

"You seem to have a line on the conditions," said Mr. Armstrong. "I will not say that some part of them are exaggerated and some part of them are not true. I heard of one or two cases of yellow fever at Panama."

Dr. Picknell, surgeon of the United States steamer Dixie, now stationed at Colon, returned on the Segurancas for his health. He said there were in all nine yellow-fever suspects when he left the isthmus. Dr. Picknell thinks the

DEATHS FROM SMALLPOX

Bodies Hurried to the Grave to Prevent Spread of Contagion.

Billings, Mont., Jan. 19.—Two more deaths from the smallpox epidemic have resulted in the past twenty-four hours at Red Lodge, near here. Annie Williams of Billings died in the pesthouse of smallpox and was buried last night. The authorities, fearing the spread of the infection, required the burial of the body within two hours after death.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 19.—The authorities today ordered the vaccination of every one in the city not having been vaccinated in two years, under penalty of a fine, and the police were ordered to round up all hoboes for the purpose of vaccination. A free vaccination station has been established for the indigent. One death from smallpox has occurred.

What Panama Needs.

Mobile, Ala., Jan. 19.—"Get good drinking water; put in a new sanitary system; screen the houses and ship something fit to eat there, and Panama will be all right."

This is the verdict of the members of the congress of physicians of North and Central and South America, recently in session at Panama and Colon. On the steamship Brighton today were a number of the physicians who had attended the congress.

Dr. C. H. Hughes, a prominent St. Louis physician, said:

"In order to make the country safe, it will be necessary to greatly improve the methods of sanitation. The city of Panama is dirty. The residents are still using water from their cisterns. The water is caught from the house-tops, and as the birds make the roofs their roosting places, it can be seen that the water is by no means pure or healthy. There is a great future for that country if the proper precautions are taken."
