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A FRESH AIR HOUSE FOR ALL-YEAR USES

A Minneapolis Architect Invents a Portable Pavilion for Tubercular Patients Who Like to Sleep Outdoors.

The frame work of the structure is light. It may be taken down and carried around on a wheelbarrow. It is built on the plan of a watch. That is, every part is made similarly so that the pieces fit into each other and may easily be replaced at any time.
