A NEW MEMORIAL DAY SUGGESTION

PLAN TO HAVE CITIZENS HONOR THE SOLDIERS.

By Taking Details of Day's Exercises Out of Their Hands, the Younger Americans Would Lighten the Heavy Burdens Now Borne by the Heroes—Many Like the Scheme.

A MEMORIAL DAY IDEA

Suggested—That in view of the advancing age of the civil war veterans and the growing appreciation of their services to the country, the responsibility for the day's observance be accorded to the citizens as a body.

Heretofore the day has been more particularly expressed in so concrete a form. While they feel a natural delicacy in suggesting the change themselves, they willingly express their approval when it is made by others.

There is the natural feeling of regret on the part of old soldiers in giving up their old-time prerogatives. They have felt that Memorial Day was the day, in which they would gather to do honor to their departed comrades.

But the winnowings of time have reduced their ranks and old age in many cases has rendered the day more general and a real burden. Old soldiers acknowledge that for some time they have been dwelling on some such plan, altho they have never expressed it in so concrete a form.

Above is an idea which is bound to receive serious consideration both by old soldiers and civilians.

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the old soldiers were willing. I have thought that upon such organizations as the Sons of Veterans would naturally devolve this task, but it is a patriotic performance in which all have an equal interest. Such a change seems inevitable in time and there is no reason why Minneapolis should not inaugurate it.

"Their Wishes Our Law."
"I think the suggested plan is a good one," said George H. Daggett. "But I

have a feeling that the old soldiers might cling to their old-time honored privilege of memorializing their dead. So long as they shall wish to do so, their wishes must be our law, but I think it would be a delicate and patriotic act to take the burden of their hands now—to make their task in life that more easier and while doing so make the observance of Memorial Day more general, one in which the living men who fought for the old flag may be honored with those who fell in battle or who had been called to answer the final rollcall since 1864.

Memorial Day is a permanent observance with us, and I feel that with the consent of the old soldiers it would be appropriate and fitting that progressive Minneapolis should inaugurate this new plan of its observance.

"If the old G. A. R. comrades will see it that way," said W. M. Regan. "I would heartily favor the suggested change. It would make the old soldier's burden lighter, and would make the day one of more general observance. The people of Minneapolis can well undertake to inaugurate such a custom, one

that seems inevitable in the course of time. By having the arrangements for the day's observance undertaken by citizens, the living as well as the dead soldiers could be more heartily honored. I would regard it as an act of patriotism and justice in which all should unite in approving."
