HIS HONOR SPEAKS AT Y. W. C. A. ANNUAL GATHERING.

Over 1,000 Women Have Lunch Every Day at the Association, Which Has Third Largest Membership in the United States—Cottage System to Be Adopted—Mrs. W. S. Patten Re-elected.

Mayor D. P. Jones heartily approves of the work of the Travelers' Aid and regards it as one of the most important charitable features of the city, as it is preventative rather than reformative. In his talk at the annual meeting of the Women's Christian association last evening he suggested that the different charities of the city should have regular meetings, monthly or quarterly, at which their work would be discussed in order that the different organizations should neither conflict nor leave needed work undone.

Reports show that 787 transients were cared for by the Travelers' Aid, which is supported by the Y. W. C. A. and of this number, 124 were free lodgers. Mrs. Boardman and Mrs. Thornton meet all of the arriving transients and their protection to women traveling alone. The rooms occupied by the Travelers' Aid are undesirable and the association would like to secure lodgings away from Washington avenue but still near the stations.

The directors' report was presented by Mrs. J. B. Phelps after the welcome had been voiced by Mrs. W. S. Patten. Rev. P. A. Cool offered prayer and Miss Alberta Butterfield sang. Mrs. W. S. Patten, recording secretary, Mrs. J. B. Phelps, treasurer, Mrs. F. E. Hertum.
