THE UNIVERSITY

APPRECIATES THEIR LIBERALITY

President Northrop Tells Southerners of Work of Minnesota Legislature.

President Cyrus Northrop considers that the Minnesota legislature has, in the past, been extremely liberal to the university. Copies of Charleston, S. C., papers contain enthusiastic reports of an address delivered by Dr. Northrop at the Centennial banquet of the South Carolina college on Jan. 10, in which he referred feelingly to the support given to the university by the legislature.
The address of President Northrop was the chief feature of the banquet. His subject was "The Universities and

Colleges of the United States." He urged the building up of the common school system in the country that there might be more of a demand for higher education, and predicted the expansion of American colleges.
Speaking of the attempt now being made to secure an appropriation of \$500,000 from the South Carolina legislature, he referred to the most recent legislative grants in Illinois, Ohio and Minnesota.
The Illinois legislature at its last session appropriated \$300,000 to the university, the Ohio legislature \$745,000 and the Minnesota legislature more than one million dollars.
He closed his address with an appeal to the governor of South Carolina, who was present, to exert his influence to secure the desired appropriation for the South Carolina college.

Underclassmen to Spell.

At the university armory tonight the freshmen will meet the sophomores in the annual class spelling match. The affair will be conducted on the lines of the old-fashioned New England spelling match and the words submitted by the judges to the contestants have been chosen by the English department at the university. In addition to the spelling match there will be other features, including a tug of war between teams from the two classes.

The '08 Banner Still Waves.

It is probable that the 1908 banner which adorns the 100-foot chimney of the engineering shops at the university will remain undisturbed by the sophomores. All efforts to remove it have failed, and as it has remained in position for a month the upperclassmen say it should be allowed to remain.

SUPREME COURT

A GRADE CROSSING CASE

THE SUPREME COURT RENDERS A DECISION AGAINST THE MILWAUKEE RAILROAD.

A decision which will hasten the abolition of grade crossings was handed down today by the supreme court. Jasper Stegner was killed on a railroad crossing and his relatives who sued for damages failed to secure a verdict. They appealed on the ground that the safety gates were open and win a new trial. The syllabus says:

LEROY STEGNER, as administrator of the estate of Jasper T. Stegner, deceased, appellant, vs. Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway company et al., respondents.

First—Open safety gates at a railroad street crossing are an implied assurance to a traveler upon the street that the tracks may be safely crossed. While such fact does not relieve him from exercising ordinary care before going upon the tracks, yet the fact must be taken into consideration in determining whether he exercised such care.
Second—The question of the contributory negligence of the plaintiff's intestate in this case was one of fact.
Order reversed and new trial granted.
