

THE HUGE ORIENTAL LINER MINNESOTA SAILS FROM SEATTLE ON MAIDEN TRIP

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 27.—The new Great Northern oriental liner, Minnesota, completed loading her cargo for her maiden voyage to the orient and sailed with 25,000 tons of merchandise for the ports of China, Japan and the Philippines. She carries as passengers a large number of prominent business men and other citizens of Seattle and of eastern cities.

The accompanying photograph shows the passenger accommodations are not by any means all taken. Her cargo space was practically all sold out for the first voyage prior to her arrival here, Dec. 23.

Since her arrival in this port the Minnesota has been visited by thousands curious to inspect the big liner at close range. A week ago she had as guests Governor Mead, Lieutenant Governor Coon and the members of the state legislature, which adjourned for a day to afford the members an opportunity to inspect her and dine on board as guests of the company.

The accompanying photograph shows the Minnesota taking coal for her voyage at the marine coal bunkers of the Pacific Coast company. The ship-loading towers of the bunkers stand 300 feet out from the sea wall, on a pier

which is 550 feet in length. As may be seen in the photograph, the towers are still well forward of the midship section of the big steamship, and the vessel extends out more than 100 feet beyond the outer end of the bunker pier.

Lying alongside the bunkers is the steamship Cottage City, one of the larger vessels of the coastwise and Alaska fleet running out of this port. The Cottage City is over 250 feet long and carries 300 passengers and 1,200 tons of cargo. But she is dwarfed into insignificance alongside the big oriental liner.

STOLE A RAILROAD, BUT COURT SAYS "NO THEFT"

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Jan. 27.—Charged with bodily stealing a railroad, Henry Kline faced the judges in criminal court today and was afterward discharged, the court holding, altho Kline admits taking the railroad, that a man could not be tried for larceny for plucking a railroad off the ground, and carrying it away any more than he could be for carrying off a house.

Kline took the railroad, an abandoned single track one, and cast it off his land as the company showed no intention of doing so. A score of neighbors aided him. The court said it was a case for the civil and not the criminal court.

FOUR MEN KILLED IN UPPER MICHIGAN MINES

Calumet, Mich., Jan. 27.—Blasting caused the almost instant death of four Finnish miners in local mines yesterday. Henry Aho and John Reini were killed at the thirty-seventh level, No. 5 shaft, Tamarack mine. A charge of dynamite exploded while they were recharging the hole.

John and Jacob Kostunen, brothers, died as the result of a premature explosion of a charge in the eighth level of the Champion mine.

NEW ULM, MINN.—Peter Schofka was found frozen stiff in a bushy lot near Cottonwood river. He evidently was stricken with illness, which prevented him summoning help.

MOODY IS SUMMONED WITH ROCKEFELLER

New York Sun Special Service. Washington, Jan. 27.—Attorney General Moody, Controller of the Currency Ridgely and John D. Rockefeller have been summoned to appear in a Chicago court to testify for the defense in the case of L. A. Gourdain and J. H. Dalton, who are charged with sending lottery tickets thru the mails. Neither Mr. Moody nor Mr. Ridgely know either of the defendants, nor anything at all about the case. The United States marshal who served the subpoenas on them, gave each of them \$50.00 to cover his expenses to Chicago and \$1.50 for a witness fee. Mr. Rockefeller's time was considered more valuable. He was given \$200 for his expenses.
