"ONLY AN ANCHOR AGAINST ENGLAND"

RUSSIA DECLARED TO HAVE LITTLE LOVE FOR AMERICA.

L. T. Guild, Pastor of Forest Heights Methodist Church, Gives His Conclusions Based Upon Observations Made While on the Russian Frontier—Romanoff Insanity.

Dr. L. T. Guild, pastor of Forest Heights Methodist church, was stationary until recently in Bulgaria, near the Russian frontier. He was engaged in publishing religious works for distribution in Russia and it became necessary for him to examine carefully the Russian system and character. "Europe will become republican or Slav according to Napoleon," said Mr. Guild this morning. "The contrast holds good. Slavic people have never developed a constitutional government. The race is prolific, patient, persistent, but does not seem to be able to develop a popular government. When the Turks took Constantinople from the Romans, the Russian tribes assumed the leadership of the fallen system in the provinces. The Russian flag bears the Roman eagle; the Russian absolutism is the outcome of Roman imperialism; Russian diplomacy is the ancient Byzantine system of graft, espionage, and deceit. Like Rome, Russia extends her power over weak nations. Nearly a hundred states and nations have been swallowed up through this policy. "Russian friendship for America means only an anchor against England. The two governments are diametrically opposed. Despotism roots deep in the past; its crust heart is just now being revealed in the massacre of the innocents. "The Russian peasant is patient, loyal to his religion and his czar, who is confused in his mind with his God. He is devout and faithful; too much given to vodka and easily controlled. He believes that the mission of Russia is to save the world, that is, to bring the world under the czar's rule. "The Romanoffs have insanity in the blood. The persecution of Jews, Slavs and Doukhobors has been the regular business of the intolerant government for many years. Human speech can never tell what they have endured. "I believe that this is the beginning of the end, but that the end will not be speedy. The analogy of the French revolution will not exactly apply, for Russia's immense standing army is largely recruited from the savage tribes whose whole history has been one of war and plunder, as brutal as a North American Indian's. These are a potent instrument in the hands of the Grand Duke Vladimir, a fitting leader. In the end, the bitter discontent will so impregnate the masses of the nation that the stifled peoples will remember their lost liberties; the anarchists and the republicans will unite and attack; the pressure from within and without will be so great that absolutism will go to its grave. "A republic would probably prove but an anarchy, but a constitutional government with Romanoffs off the stage, would be a blessing to the world, as the despotism is now a curse and a menace."

BILL WILL GO TO THE LEGISLATURE

MANY CITY ASSOCIATIONS APPROVE PROPOSED MEASURE.

Act Which Will Permit the Diversion of Bassett's Creek Discussed at Meeting at the Commercial Club—Hennepin Legislators to Be Asked to Support It.

A bill drawn by C. J. Rockwood, the specific purpose of which is to permit

the diversion of Bassett's creek so it will empty into Cedar lake instead of running across the North Side, also it is formulated so as to be of general application, was approved last night by representatives of the North Side Commercial club and of the different improvement associations of the city. The bill will be introduced in the legislature during a few days by Senator Calhoun and the Hennepin county delegation will be asked to give it hearty support.

The meeting took the form of a supper in the rooms of the Commercial club in the Andrus building, at which the following were present: C. W. Van Tuyl, Linden Hills Improvement association; R. B. Tomlinson and F. M. Henry, Oak Park Improvement association; Perry Starkweather, Bryn Mawr improvement association; Dr. U. H. Wilcox, North Side Commercial club; Judge J. H. Steele, Lake of the Isles Improvement association; J. U. Barnes and C. I. Fuller, real estate board; C. J. Rockwood and Representatives W. W. Bardwell and C. L. Wallace.

now or hereafter having a population exceeding 50,000, and to enable such cities to divert the course of streams and control the plan thereof, for the purpose of affording as well as for the purpose of furnishing increased water power to its lakes and parks.

The bill provides not only for the assessment of damages, but also for the assessment of benefits, where benefits accrue, but the same "not to exceed the aggregate net award of damages, added to the cost of construction."

Means Much for the North Side.

The interest of the North Side which is being voiced by the action of the Commercial club is a material one. The diversion of the stream would make valuable a great deal of property and would increase the sightliness of the section. A sewer would supply the drainage facilities now offered by the creek.

It is estimated by North Siders that the cost of the improvement would be about twenty-seven thousand dollars. It is thought there would be little to pay in damages, as much of the property past which the stream would be run would receive accruing benefits thru drainage facilities offered.

Unanimous for It.

There was unanimity of opinion as to the desirability of changing the stream's course, the only debate arising over various features of the proposed bill, which covers all features relative to damages, methods of publication of notice, etc.

It was finally approved with only one or two minor changes, and a committee, consisting of C. W. Van Tuyl, F. M. Henry, Judge J. H. Steele and C. J. Rockwood, was appointed to confer with the Hennepin legislators. Stress is laid on the title of the bill, which is called "An act to enlarge the powers, for sanitary purposes, of cities

AL LEECH, Star of "Girls Will Be Girls."

Al Leech, the star of "Girls Will Be Girls," has seen the world in many different phases. He was born some thirty years ago in Wheeling, W. Va., and started when only 7 as a newsboy, selling the Wheeling Register until he became 14. He then entered a nail factory and worked at that trade for four years. While he was a "newsy," he was the life and love of all the boys. Being an excellent dancer and a good singer, he became a favorite in his craft. Another hobby, Jack Donagan—or "Skimpy," as he was called on account of being so thin—who was a great chum of Leech, died of consumption contracted thru being out in all kinds of weather. He had the support of his poor old mother and two sisters. So the old newsboys clubbed together and got up an entertainment for their benefit. The entertainment netted \$320. Leech—or "Legs," as he was nicknamed—was prevailed upon to do a turn, and, while exceedingly nervous, made a great hit. Leech drifted out of that and became one of the great headliners on the vaudeville stage.
