FOUND "SUPERS" BELOW THE FLOOR

SO RAILROADS ISSUE A PECULIAR ORDER.

Theatrical Companies Caught Making Beds 'on the Road' for Minor Members of the Troupes—Beds Put a Stop to the Practice, Which Has Been Expensive. Chicago, Feb. 1.—Private and leased passenger cars in the future must be "all above board," otherwise the railroads will not haul them. Notices to this effect have been sent by the various companies to theatrical agents, in accordance with instructions from the Western Passenger associations. "Make no more contracts," the order sent by one of the companies read in substance, "to haul private or leased cars with sleeping accommodations below the floor." The agent receiving the order explained the mystery. "The theatrical companies are the offenders," he said. "They want to haul their members cheaply, and they have devised some wonderful contrivances to get around the regulations. You have noticed the chests under the cars for ice, food and equipment of various kind. That is where the trouble comes in. Special cars have been built with unusually large compartments below the floor. To look at the cars one would conclude that they were stored and provisioned for a trans-continental trip. "That is what the inspectors of the association supposed until they learned the truth. They found those roomy chests really were sleeping quarters for the 'supers' of the show company. One Uncle Tom's Cabin combination has seven companies on the road, each company traveling in its private car. And each car carries six stowaways 'on the road.' "The inspectors then got busy. They went into the yards and saw the cars loaded and unloaded. They saw enough to convince them that the railroads were losing hundreds of dollars every year in fares. The instructions from the association followed."
