THE WISCONSIN WALL-TOWN OF PREHISTORIC DAYS

AZTALAN FINEST SPECIMEN OF MOUND-BUILDING AGE. Enemies Could Command the Site from Several Vantage Points, and the Object of the Great Enclosure Is a Mystery—One Theory Is that It Was for Protection Against Wild Beasts.

Special to The Journal. Baraboo, Wis., Feb. 6.—In many respects Aztalan, in this state, is among the most remarkable prehistoric mounds in the northwest. It is the only brick-walled townsite found in this country.

It is on the bottom land of the Crayfish river, about two miles from Lake Mills. The inclosing walls of the townsite are about 700 feet on its flanks and 1,500 feet long. The river served to complete the inclosure of settlements. Within and without the inclosure there are round, truncated and oblong mounds. Just beyond the inclosing walls the land rises abruptly over twenty feet to the rolling tableland of the surrounding country.

The purpose of its inhabitants in constructing this inclosure over a half mile long still remains a mystery. The most remarkable art of Aztalan is its brick walls and walks. In this it differs from the mounds of the Mississippi valley. These brick walls are not regular in form and size, as are the modern bricks. They are simply balls of plastic clay welded by the hand into small bricks of irregular form about the average size of a snowball.

The material used was the glacially derived red clay of the vicinity and the color of the bricks is red or light yellow. Under the glass scrapings appear like a handful of crystal sand.

BIG CREAMERY PROJECTED. Co-operative Company to Build at Jim Falls, Near Chippewa.

CHIPPWEA FALLS, WIS.—One of the largest mounds in the section will be erected at Jim Falls, near this city. Work is already being begun. The butter factory will be 50 feet by 12 feet and the cheese factory 18 by 28 feet. The name of the company is the Jim Falls Co-operative Butter & Cheese company, and it is capitalized at \$10,000.

WAUSAU-MERRILL TROUBLE. Right of Way Along the Wisconsin Has Been Secured.

MERRILL, WIS.—For a year or more there has been talk of an electric railway from Wausau to Merrill, but no definite steps have been taken to put the project into operation. The right-of-way between Merrill and Wausau is now being secured by the Wisconsin Electric & Light company.

LA CROSSE, WIS.—A dispatch from Cashton, Wis., says that the building used as a village hall and fire department headquarters burned. The loss is estimated at \$5,000.

MONROE, MINN.—A meeting of the farmers was held Saturday and steps taken to organize a co-operative association in order to conduct a general merchandise store. Temporary officers were elected and about \$5,000 subscribed to build a new school building.

IOWA FALLS, IOWA.—The program was inaugurated at the Marshalltown District Epworth League rally, to be held in this city on Wednesday.
