BIG FISH JAM AT LAKE KAMPESKA
FIVE WAGONLOADS TAKEN OUT IN AN AFTERNOON.
Picketed Weighing Twenty Pounds Scooped Out with Pitchforks, Rakes and Other Tools—Finnish Tribe Moves in a Body from the Sioux River to the Lake.

THE WEATHER

Alarmed by the ravages of the white plague in Minnesota, the local anti-tuberculosis committee met in the offices of the Associated Charities at noon today to begin a crusade for a city sanatorium. Thirty-three new cases, pronounced incurable, have come to light through the investigations of the committee in the past month and 130 other persons are in immediate danger from those who are the committee says that a majority of those coming in contact with the diseased are children, who are carrying the plague into the public schools.

At the "get-together" dinner given last night at the Hotel Nicolet by the Minneapolis Retailers' Association for the city officials, City Assessor C. J. Minor cranked talk about the state board of equalization. In explanation of the extra and unexplained taxation that had been laid upon Minneapolis, Mr. Minor showed how the state board had increased the assessments here without warrant or reason. He went further and singled out two members of the board and practically accused them of being tax dodgers.

The first effort of the village of Excelsior to throw off the antiquated kerosene lamp has had a serious setback. Fire, which started shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, put the gas plant out of business, causing a loss of about \$5,000, and sent every household in the town to the cellar or garret to find anything that would give a light. Relegated lamps, candles and, in some cases, laughable improvisations were used.

Removal talk has created a stir among the members. It is said that citizens of Oshkosh and Milwaukee are coming here to work for removal, and Madison business men are alarmed. They treated the matter at first as a joke, but are beginning now to realize the seriousness of it. It is probable it will become an issue if the administration does not take a stand in the matter.

Waterbury, S. D., Feb. 8.—Last fall a sandbar formed across the outlet of Lake Kampeska. When the ice came this outlet existed, and therefore no fish have been able to get into or out of the lake. Early this week there was a movement of fish from the Sioux river to the lake, and the result was that all kinds of the sunny tribe crowded into the outlet. The fact became noted around and men went out to enjoy the sport of fishing there. Over five wagonloads were taken out in one afternoon. Men used pitchforks, rakes, hook spears, in fact anything, and scooped out of the water as they came up for air pickered weighing from twenty to twenty pound.

A snowstorm extends over much of the upper lake region, Minnesota, Wisconsin, eastern South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Montana, and the central parts of Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, and Mississippi.

These 130 persons are in the same rooms and in many cases sleep in the same beds as the sufferers. Four cases especially were discussed. The first was that of a small woman who died a month ago from tuberculosis. The second child, a daughter of 15, nursed her mother and contracted the disease. There is little hope of recovery.
