## INTERESTED IN GORKY

### WRITERS' LEAGUE HEADQUARTERS HERE, AROUSED BY INCARCERATION OF FAMOUS RUSSIAN.

If the Russian government does not release Maxim Gorky, it will find authors all over the world arrayed against it. This would be a tremendous force if organized.

The Writers' League comes nearer to being international than any other band of authors, said H. H. Rowell, president of the organization, today. "While Minneapolis is the headquarters, we always receive new members when they come up to the requirements. We have members in all parts of the world, not very many, but active ones. To show what a power organization gives, I need only say that some Armenians who were being persecuted in Turkey came to this country thru the influence of the league and have had an opportunity to develop their genius. However, the league does not at present meddle with politics to any great extent, as other problems are more important."

## COLORED WOMEN'S FEDERATION

State Clubs Yesterday Decided to Form a State Association. Since the refusal of the Minnesota Federation of Women's clubs to admit the Adelphi club, an organization of colored women in Minneapolis and St. Paul, the leading colored women of the state have been considering the organizing of a state federation of their own race.

A meeting for organization was held yesterday in the old capitol in St. Paul. There were eighty-eight delegates present, representing thirty clubs in Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth. The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Jennie Scott of Minneapolis, who was president of the Adelphi when it applied for admission to the Minnesota federation. The women were addressed by J. Q. Adams, editor of the Appeal, and Fred L. McChesney of St. Paul. Mr. McChesney, in his speech, said: "Teach your children to stand for every right that the constitution and laws of our government guarantee to an American citizen; teach them to aspire to all heights; teach them that he who bends his knee that favor might follow fawning becomes despised as a coward; teach them always to be true to the highest interest of the race and to never forget or forsake their own people. Teach them early to know that next to their duty to God there can be no higher duty than they owe their race and no rights higher than the rights of humanity. And these rights are common to all men."

The delegates voted to organize a state federation and elected the following officers: Mrs. Jasper Gibbs of Minneapolis was elected president; Mrs. Katie Merril, St. Paul, vice president; Mrs. L. Johnson of Duluth, second vice president; Mrs. W. Joyce of Minneapolis, recording secretary, and Mrs. L. B. Hickman of St. Paul, state organizer.

The first convention will be held in July at a date to be fixed by the president. The place will probably be Minneapolis.
