SKATING

Skating is to be revived in Minneapolis and a strong effort will be made to put the sport on the high footing that it was years ago in this section when Nilsson, Johnson, Sudheimer, Davidson, Rind and other well known knights of the steel runners held forth in this city.

The final step was taken last night at the Minnesota Athletic Club when the thirty skaters of the twin cities met and organized the national "Twin City Skating Club." The local organization will be affiliated with the Western Skating association, which controls all skaters of the west.

Allan Blanchard, president of the Western association, was in attendance and pointed out the advantages of joining the club. J. C. Sudheimer of St. Paul was chosen president; T. V. Thomson, Minneapolis, secretary; C. M. Thomson, Minneapolis, treasurer; and J. C. Sudheimer, Minneapolis, secretary of the twin cities. The meeting will be held Sunday, Feb. 19, at the St. Paul hall park skating rink.

The executive committee of the National Amateur Skating association yesterday changed the date of the national amateur speed skating championship to Feb. 24 at St. Nicholas at Pittsburgh, Pa.

All skaters who decided at the indoor championships are a quarter-mile race for boys under 12 years, a half-mile scratch race for boys under 16 years, and a one-mile race for men. A committee was appointed to investigate Morris Woods' proposed trip to the United States. The committee and the amateur champion contemplated the possibility of competing in the world championship of Johnny Nelson, the professional star. Secretary Clark was appointed to look after the trouble which arose over expenses for the trip to Pittsburgh for the championship.

All in all, the skaters of the figure skating championships in which noted foreigners will meet American stars on Feb. 24 at St. Nicholas rink.

GOLF

All may not be serene at the annual meeting of the United States Golf association to be held in St. Paul, Minn., on Feb. 15. There appears to be no immediate likelihood of a split in the association, but the report of the special committee is disappointing to the west.

The executive committee of the association, which is composed of the clubs in this section, has a plan which will greatly increase the number of the powers of the clubs in this section. The plan is to have the clubs in this section elect one-third of the executive committee. This reduction in dues will not alter the fact that the allied clubs will greatly outnumber the active, yet the latter are still left in control. It is obvious that a state of affairs like this cannot last forever.

This would be a very desirable arrangement, but the prominent clubs have their delegates present on these occasions, so that they would be unable to attend. It is in that way not compelled to make a special journey to attend the annual meeting. The plan would have several months sooner where their next championships would be held.

BILLIARDS

Conklin and Gardner have decided between them to play off their tie for high average this afternoon. Conklin is evenly matched with Sigourney, but the latter has a slight edge on the result of tonight's game between Sigourney and Gardner.

CLEMENT IS LEFT WITHOUT A HOME

AGED FARIBAULT BANKER MORTGAGED HOMESTEAD.

Nature of the Deal, on Which the Embellishment Charge Against Him Is Based, Is Disclosed—An Explanation of the Drafts Forwarded to Dr. A. C. Rogers.

Farihault, Minn., Feb. 10.—Thomas B. Clement, late head of the collapsed First National bank, seems literally to have nothing left. Even his homestead is gone, having been decided to a Buffalo, N. Y. bank as security for a loan of \$15,000. This was disclosed to the directors of the bank some time ago, when it was decided to raise \$100,000 to try to set the bank on its feet. Mr. Clement, at that time, is said to have agreed to contribute his homestead and his life insurance, of which he holds a large amount, as security for his share of the \$100,000. When it came to making the arrangements, however, it was found that the home was already mortgaged.

Embellishment Charge.

The nature of the deal which furnishes the basis of the third charge upon Mr. Clement was arrested last Monday has been learned. The story is as follows:

Some years ago a man named Bean borrowed \$5,000 from the bank, giving his note for the sum. He was unable to meet it on maturity and later removed to another part of the state, where he prospered.

Mr. Clement, learning of this, drew on him for \$500, to apply on the note, and the payment indorsed on the note. When the receiver took charge of the bank he sent Bean and all other persons owing the institution money a demand for the amount due. In Bean's case the demand was for \$4,500, as his note showed a payment of only \$500. The receiver is said to have received a reply from Bean to the effect that his indebtedness was only \$3,500, as subsequent to the \$500 payment he had paid a draft for \$1,000.

An investigation is said to have verified this contention, and it is reported that the \$1,000 was discovered to have been credited to Mr. Clem-
