RAILROADS MAKE REPRISALS

ABANDON PROJECTED IMPROVEMENTS IN WISCONSIN. Object to New System of Taxation by Which the State Will Receive \$2,000,000 More Than Was Paid Last Year—Work Stopped on Extensions and Repairs.

New York Sun Special Service. Chicago, March 9.—The Inter Ocean says today: Because of the hostility of Wisconsin towards the railroads they have decided not to carry out plans for improvements in that state which would cost millions of dollars.

The North-Western and St. Paul systems, it is stated, have decided not to invest any more capital in Wisconsin than is absolutely necessary until assured that they can maintain reasonable rates and will not be unreasonably taxed. This year, under a new system of taxation, the railroads will be forced to pay about \$2,000,000 more in taxes in Wisconsin than they paid last year.

The most important railway project suspended because of the anti-railway legislation in Wisconsin, is the St. Louis and Green Bay and Northern rail. The North-Western system began the construction of this line, but has ordered all construction work stopped and has no idea of resuming.

WILL GIVE HOMESTEADS

Frisco Plans to Amalgamate Interests of Corporation and Employees. To establish an "entente cordiale" among the employees of the Frisco line will give each employee with a homestead. Chairman B. F. Youkum studied the system used in France to successfully amalgamate the interests of the corporation and employees. First experiments are to be made on the Texas line. The idea is to sell to every employee a parcel of five or ten acres of land tributary to the railroad, supplied with water, and at a fair valuation, to be paid for in ten years, deferred payments bearing a low rate of interest. One provision of the plan is that an employee who has availed himself of this privilege dies, or is killed in an accident while in the service of the company, the land and all improvements thereon will go to his family, without further obligation on their part.

It is provided, further, that should an employee open a business enterprise with the company from any cause whatever, before the completion of his contract, all the money paid in by him will be returned to him in full at the rate that has been charged.
