PRESIDENT PLANS CAPITAL'S BEAUTY

Appoints Consultative Board of Architects to Pass on Sites and Plans.

Washington, March 15.—The president today stole a march on Speaker Cannon by appointing a "consultative" board of architects, with an order that all sites and plans for new government buildings must be submitted to and approved by them before construction work can proceed. The members of the board, who are to serve without pay, are Bernard K. Green, chairman; Daniel H. Barnham, Charles F. McKim, Gustavus Franklin Stevens and Frederick Law Olmstead, Jr. The president's purpose is "to bring about harmony of design in all future public buildings and conformity to an artistic system of improvement based on the original plans for laying out the capital. The examination of the board of architects should be confined to the location and to the artistic effect of the exterior of the buildings."

The original plans referred to were submitted several years ago by a park commission composed of Messrs. McKim, Burnham and Olmstead, and congress has been wrangling over them ever since. They looked to the construction of all government buildings along the Mall, which extends from the capitol to the Washington monument, and on the squares around the White House and capitol, together with an elaborate park and monument system, and involved a total expenditure of \$600,000,000, the congress financial experts say.

Mr. Cannon, first, as chairman of the appropriation committee, and later as speaker of the house, led the fight against the proposed plan, and it never was approved either the senate or house. The park commission went into a rapid decline and was given what was believed to be its death blow during the last session, when the new agricultural department building, which is to cost \$2,500,000 or more, was authorized without any reference to the scheme for a beautiful Washington.

Representative Wadsworth, chairman of the agricultural committee, aided Speaker Cannon in his fight on the commission's plan and secured independent action.

Mr. Cannon and Representative Wadsworth will renew their fight as soon as the next session of congress opens and will either abolish the new board or tie its hands so that it will be powerless. The trouble will be hastened if the board attempts to alter the plans for the new department of agriculture, on which work now is under way. The building is farther back from the Mall than the commission wanted it located, and is not of the desired design.

PANAMA WILL HAVE NEW SILVER COINS

Operation began on Feb. 4 the delicate operation of converting the old Colombian currency, no win circulation, distributing in its stead the new Panama currency, which will have for its basis the gold balboa named thus in commemoration of the first discoverer of the Pacific ocean in the vicinity of Panama—Vasco Nunez de Balboa.

The operation will be a complicated one, because a large majority of the natives are too illiterate to understand the change.

long enough to grasp the ups and downs of the present currency. Everybody in Panama is speaking of the coming balboa as the gold dollar, etc. No such gold balboa is to be issued yet. What is to be issued right away is a Panamanian silver peso. The gold balboa, or dollar, which will serve as the basis for the new currency, will wait. The silver peso will be made up of 50-cent pieces and four of these 50-cent pieces will make the equivalent of one American dollar. The minor coins will have a fixed value.

Knoxville, Tenn., March 15.—An attempt at escape and wholesale liberation of prisoners at the branch state penitentiary at Petros, Tenn., was frustrated by the timely discovery of the arch plotters, John Hatfield, sentenced to twelve years from Claiborne county, and George Graham, sent from Memphis for five years.

GIRLS PROSTRATED BY FRIGHT AT "GHOST"

The "ghost" disappeared, but no one dared go home, and a neighboring farmer took them in for the night.

OFF FOR OTTAWA

Manitoba Delegation Will Urge Boundary Extension.
