MINNEAPOLIS WOMAN PUBLISHES A VALUABLE BROCHURE.

Mrs. Lucy Wilder Morris of Minneapolis is the author of a recently issued brochure entitled "European Primer for the Peniless." This book not only tells prospective travelers what to do and how to do it, but how to see Europe for an almost unbelievably small sum.

Mrs. Morris' book is not based on theories, but on her experiences in a recent European trip. The baggage she carried, as stated in her primer, is that \$500 will enable one to pay the whole expense of a six months' trip to Europe, including steamer passage and fees.

Her first advice is to take as little baggage as possible, as it involves constant expense and consumes much time in looking after it. The baggage she carried was one twenty-six-inch hold-all and a satin bag large enough to hold the necessities for a one-night stay. The satin bag could be carried constantly without inconvenience or fatigue, being apparently only an ordinary shopping bag.

A hold-all weighs practically nothing, holds more for its size and packs more easily than any baggage carrier. It should be waterproof and have plenty of strong straps. The amount of clothing to be carried is also discussed.
