HOUSE JOURNALS AS NOW PRINTED DO NOT SHOW THAT THE REVISED CODE WAS EVER PASSED.

According to the files of the house journal the revised code never has passed the house, and is improperly in the senate. Either a clerical or a printer's error omitted an essential part of the house proceedings. The necessary correction will be made in the permanent record of the house.

WANT FIRE MARSHAL

Legislators Cling to the Idea of Appointing a State Officer.

Another bill to create the office of state fire marshal is under consideration. It will be discussed at a meeting this evening of the house committee on insurance rates, and Insurance Commissioner T. D. O'Brien. The bill will include, in addition to the officer's authority to investigate fires, authority to investigate insurance rates, if he finds rates unfair in certain towns he is first to complain to the fire underwriters associations, and if this complaint fails, to ask the insurance commissioner to bring action thru the district court.

The Legislature BUSY WEEK IS AHEAD FOR SOLONS

HEAVY WORK NECESSARY TO CLEAR THE CROWDED DECKS.

Senate Has Revised Code to Work on in a Few Days—Investigation of Johnson Report Resumed This Afternoon by the Committee.

Both houses of the legislature met this afternoon in short sessions, the house at 2 o'clock and the senate at 4. A busy week is before the members, for bills will soon have to pass the house where the session is expected to go the rest of way before adjournment, which comes four weeks from tomorrow.

ASKED TO SIGN PROTEST

RAILROAD AGENTS INSTRUCTED TO SECURE SIGNATURES FROM SHIPPERS AGAINST DEMURRAGE BILL.

George S. Loftus, head of the shippers' committee which is fighting for the reciprocal demurrage bill, has secured a copy of a letter sent out by Minnesota railroad companies to their agents, asking them to get signatures to a petition against the bill. He has given it out to show the method being used to prove it with the fact that there is a sentiment against the bill among the shippers. The letter is dated March 16, and reads as follows:

The Minnesota house of representatives yesterday passed by a large majority a bill known as house file No. 32, and commonly referred to as a "Reciprocal Demurrage Bill".

TAFT IS LIKELY TO SUCCEED HAY

Present Secretary of State to Retire from Cabinet if He Fails to Regain Health.

Washington, March 20.—Secretary Hay will do more work until this fall, and if his health then be not greatly improved he will retire from the cabinet, in which event it is considered certain that he will be succeeded by Taft, who will be the real head of the state department while Mr. Hay is away.

SALE OF LIQUORS IN VATICAN ENDED

Pope Abolishes Drug Store Which Was Doing a Large Business in "Elixirs."

Rome, March 20.—The Vatican drug store, which was established by Pope Leo XIII. about twenty-five years ago, to supply the needs of the 3,000 or more persons who form the population of the papal residence, has been closed by order of Pius X. As packages addressed to the Vatican are exempt from custom inspection and duty, the new drug store was soon underselling similar stores in Rome, and got many patrons who formerly bought of the city drug stores. The pope took advantage of this to extend its operations, and many special brands of elixirs and cordials, including liquors, were placed on sale, mostly in large quantities.

POLICY TOWARD FRANCE SETTLED.

It has been determined to oppose the strongest resistance to the bill just drafted by the parliamentary commission for the separation of church and state.

The proposed bill grants the right to the Catholics in each district to form religious associations in order to take title to all ecclesiastical property, which shall not by right belong to the state. Such religious associations are to hold the administration of all ecclesiastical properties independently of the bishops and priests who are administering to the spiritual needs of the population, and thus the spectacle would be offered of bishops and priests at the mercy of prominent laymen in the several districts.

COFFEE AND TEA REMAIN UNTAXED

Sereno E. Payne Says Beer Tax Will Be Unchanged—Plenty of Money.

Washington, March 20.—"All this talk about putting a duty on coffee and tea, and increasing the internal revenue tax on beer is nonsense. There is no necessity for changing the present revenue raising law, in order to get more money. The treasury has plenty of money as things are."

PRUSSIAN STATESMAN DEAD.

Berlin, March 20.—Baron von Hammerstein, Prussian minister of the interior, is dead. He had been ill with asthma, complicated by heart weakness.
