MUST BE MISTAKE

Record of Council at Variance with Castner-Duryea Pamphlet.

Aldermen Frank Castner and J. H. Duryea have issued a pamphlet setting forth the advantages of Italy by water supply by means of artesian wells, as suggested by Professor N. H. Winchell.

RADICAL CHANGES IN REGULATIONS

BUILDING INSPECTOR HOUGHTON FINISHES ORDINANCE.

Regulating the Height of Buildings—City to Control Illuminated Signs on Streets—Closer Watch on Elevator Shafts and Cars—Concrete Blocks to Undergo a Rigid Inspection.

James G. Houghton, building inspector, has completed a new building ordinance, in which radical changes from the old regulations have been made. The new ordinance will, if passed, bring building work under complete control of the city.

As illuminated signs are often the cause of fire, the ordinance provides that they shall be hung only by a licensed sign hanger under bond of \$5,000. Signs that by special permit are allowed to project more than three feet over the sidewalk must be at least twelve feet high.

Will Examine Blocks.

Concrete blocks will be examined by the inspector before they can be used in construction, and if they are not up to the standard, may be destroyed.

As the owners of large signs are getting a privilege not entirely authorized by law, the ordinance requires that the lights in all illuminated signs shall be lighted during the same hours that the regular city lamps are burning.

Wired glass, by the new provisions, will be used in all windows opening on alleys or where the windows face another building.

After the Elevators.

Builders of elevators and elevator shafts will be held to a more rigid rule. More head room, above the car on the top floor, will be required and the weights will have to be fastened into the frame that carries them.

Washington, March 21.—While no official confirmation can be obtained here of the report that President Roosevelt will appoint Seth Bullock marshal for South Dakota, there are indications that it is true.

The only member of the congressional delegation new in Washington is Senator Gamble. He would not discuss the matter, but the members of the delegation had not considered the question of appointing Kennedy's successor because his present term does not expire for a year.

From other sources, however, the impression is gained that the delegation has received an intimation of the president's intentions toward his old friend, and that when the time comes to make the appointment, they will register a protest against the selection of a man so rapidly endorsed by them.
