

Dr. J. W. Frizzell, pastor of the First Congregational church here, asserted that if the devil himself offered him \$100,000 he would take it and be glad to get it.

"Such folly as this will set a bad precedent," said Dr. Frizzell. "Whenever a man like Rockefeller opens his heart to a charitable inclination he ought to be allowed to carry out his purpose without opposition from anyone. This growing sentiment that there should be a closer scrutiny as to the origin and motives of gifts is all a farce."

A LAW FOR PRIVATE BANKS
