GULLIBILITY OF WOMEN.

Ask Mrs. Chadwick What She Thinks About Their Susceptibility to the Wiles of Sharpers.

BRIDGE OPENED IN A HIGH GALE

AERIAL FERRY AT DULUTH IS NOW IN OPERATION.

Cost \$100,000 and Is the Only One of Kind on Western Continent—Cars, Suspended by Cables, Slide Back and Forth Across 394 Feet of Canal—Electricity the Motive Power.

Duluth, Minn., March 28.—In the teeth of a blinding northwest gale, blowing at the rate of forty miles an hour, forty passengers boarded the aerial ferry at Duluth today for the first time since its opening at 6 o'clock last evening.

Several scores of persons gathered at the government pier, anxious to see the new mode of being among the first passengers to cross the great waterway.

The ferry, which was begun one year ago and has cost \$100,000, is the only one of its kind in the western hemisphere, and it worked last night to the complete satisfaction of the builders and the city authorities.

The cars, suspended by cables, slide back and forth across the 394 feet of canal, the motive power being electricity.
