



NEWS OF THE NORTH WEST

IOWA LODGEROOM OF ELKS RAIDED

LIQUOR SEIZED IS ORDERED BEFORE GRAND JURY.
Mason City Convulsed by the Predicament of 480 Lodgers, Some of Whom Are Members of Churches—Each Is Subject to a Fine of from \$100 to \$300, Enough to Pay School Debt.

Mason City, Iowa, April 4.—No end of speculation is rife here as to the outcome of a raid on the Elks lodge, which has resulted in the hearing of the liquor, which amounted to three dozen bottles of beer, part of two gallons of whisky, part two gallons of wine and two-quarter bottle of gin, was ordered held to the grand jury which convenes this week.

Where the grand jury will be the theme of interest. According to the strict interpretation of the code of Iowa, every member of the lodge is thought to be liable to a fine one from \$100 to \$300. At a \$300 fine for each of the 480 members, the school debt could be paid and money left for improvements of various sorts, and the Elks are the butt of much chaff from their friends.

Some bad feeling is also being engendered. Every church in the city has representatives in the lodge, and some are even members of the lodge boards. There seems to be a determination to bring these men into court, as it was at the instance of a minister that the lodge was raided.

A pretty little contest is on at Thornton, in the southwestern part of the county, between merchants and farmers who are promoters of a cooperative elevator company. The merchants having discovered that the co-operative associations were cutting into their trade by attracting farmers to the elevators decided to build one at Thornton and make it a co-operative farmers' and merchants' association. They expect the elevator to be ready for business in a few days and want to own 51 per cent of the stock. The farmer contingent balks at this proposition and is after a controlling interest for itself.

The merchants declare that all they want is to be protected from the elevator company going into the hands of the government and running them out of business, and to save they desire the controlling interest. The farmers on the other hand, do not want to be tied up if the present merchants should die their successors could charge exorbitant prices for their goods.

S. X. Way and A. A. Cooper of Dubuque have just made a sale of \$85,000 worth of Canadian lands to a group of men who own a great caravan soon to become the practical owners of the big tract. The lands are southwest of Winona, in the townships of W. A. Holahan and T. A. Potter of this city have made a big strike in gypsum lands between Manly and Winthrop lakes, which will undoubtedly yield them a fortune. They have 2,000 acres of the deposit, which are found in hills varying in height from five to thirty-five feet. A mill has been put in operation and the company has secured its own dock and wharf to transport gypsum from on a large scale.

County Treasurer Tucker has called in the first thirty of the courthouse bonds. These were issued five years ago for the erection of a courthouse, and the first issue of \$30,000 has fallen due. The total bonded indebtedness amounted to \$70,000, and this payment has reduced the county debt so far as the courthouse is concerned to \$45,000.

IDAHO HOOSIER BOY FRIGHTENED INTO INSANITY IN IDAHO

Victim of a Mock Holdup, He Sends for His Mother and Begins Suit for \$10,000 Against His Tormentors—Mind Is Falling and Treatment at an Asylum Will Be Necessary.

Special to The Journal. Teocoma, Wash., April 4.—Ray Nanes went to Wana, Idaho, from Spencer, Ind., three months ago to work in the postoffice and country store. His companions took delight in scaring him by relating how practically all "tenderloins" entering the country were killed off. Farmers coming to town were induced to tell how a stranger in their neighborhood had just been killed.

One night, when Nanes was recovering from appendicitis, four men entered the store with masks, holding up Nanes and two others. Nanes was badly frightened, and his fright continued after he learned that the holdup was a practical joke. He was taken to a hospital in Lewiston, where he is still undergoing treatment. His mother has been requested by wire to come to him.

Two weeks ago Nanes commenced a damage suit for \$10,000 against the perpetrators of the holdup. About one week ago the defendant met him in the street and cursed him. That night Nanes suffered a relapse, and since then he has been hearing voices and seeing visions of masked men, and pleads guilty for protection. It is believed he will have to be sent to an asylum.

MINNESOTA SEEK HOMES IN THE VALLEY
Advance Guard of "Luxemburgers" Arrive at Crookston.
CROOKSTON, MINN.—With the arrival in the city of a score of "Luxemburgers" from the German empire, a movement had begun which will result in the building of hundreds of persons to the Red river valley.

Those who came yesterday have purchased land near McIntosh, east of here, on the Duluth line, and will devote their attention to farm work this summer. They are all well-to-do, and their relatives and friends who are eager to leave the country, are sending them money in other ways, an advance guard which will report to friends and home folks the result of their work in the new country.

"Luxemburgers" are skilled farmers and dairy-men, and the general opinion is that if McIntosh should the colony be established there, success will crown the efforts of the sturdy, hard-working farmers who are seeking a free and independent life.

After a year of litigation and dispute, and a half-dozen trials, the famous township of Chester land contract case, in which Charles A.
