EUROPE TO HELP MAKE RATE LAWS

Railroad Experts from Old World to Tell Senators What They Think and Know.

Washington, April 11.—European railway experts will be invited to visit the United States in solving the railway rate question, and the best lawyers in this country will be requested to give the senate interstate commerce committee the benefit of their views, so as to help the committee to frame a law which will stand the legal test as to its constitutionality.

Notwithstanding the opposition of Senator Elkins, chairman of the committee, to any legislation granting the interstate commerce commission power to fix rates, an earnest effort will be made to solve the great problem. Next Monday the committee will begin hearing American railway presidents on this subject and the hearings will continue for some time, at least until the international railway congress convenes in this city, May 4.

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
