### BOY'S COLD-BLOODED MURDER

Willie Arrington Shown to Have Shot His Steppfather Five Times.  
MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 12.—The coroner's inquest and post-mortem examination on the body of William Sitts, who was killed by his stepson yesterday, showed that it was a horrible cold-blooded murder, as the evidence clearly established that he got away from his stepson, Willie Arrington, and that he had nothing with which to defend himself.

The post-mortem examination showed that five shots were fired, one striking in the chest, one cut the coat between the shoulders and the other three striking the head. When asked why he shot Arrington, the boy said: "Well, the shooting was done with an old rifle which my stepfather had bought for me. He had a 22-rifle in the hands of Willie Arrington, with intent to kill, and the shooting was not justifiable. The boy will consequently be held to the district court."

### THREE HUNDRED MEN OUT OF WORK

F. AUGUSTUS HEINZE TIES UP THE PARROT MINE.

Charges that Agents of the Amalgamated, His Inflexible Rival, Are Extracting Ores from His Property, the Nipper—Federal Court Grants an Injunction.

Special to The Journal. Butte, Mont., April 13.—Three hundred miners were thrown out of employment yesterday afternoon by the closing of the Parrot mine thru an injunction issued out of the federal court on the application of F. Augustus Heinze. The Nipper Consolidated Copper company, in an action instituted Tuesday, charged that the Parrot Silver & Copper company's agents were extracting ore from the Nipper vein on various levels and hoisting it to the surface thru the Parrot shaft. The defendants are asked to appear in federal court on April 19 and show cause why the order should not be made permanent pending a settlement of the case, wherein the Parrot company is accused of wrongfully taking ore from the Nipper vein amounting to \$5,000,000.

The application for the injunction was supported by the affidavits of Alfred Frank and R. H. Wilson, engineers for Heinze. "On the 1,700-foot level," said Mr. Frank, "a crosscut has been driven 200 feet to the Nipper vein. From this point drifts have been run in on the vein for a distance of over 100 feet. The mining of ore is being actively engaged in this drift."

Mr. Frank alleges that \$6,000 worth of ore is being stolen from the drift each day. The affidavits allege that like operations have been carried on in the slopes and crosscuts from other levels from the 1,700 up to the 1,000. The Parrot mine is one of the oldest producing properties of the Amalgamated Copper company. It has been operated for more than thirty years and millions of dollars worth of ore has been taken from the rich veins springing its boundaries.

### Slattery's Second Trial

The second trial of Jerry Slattery, a well-known sporting man, charged with the murder of Patrick Mahoney on July 31 last, has begun here before Judge Donlan. The first day's session witnessed some of the bitterest wrangling heard in the local courts in some time. Judge Donlan warning the opposing counsel they must desist and preserve the decorum of the court or he would impose fines.

Mahoney was shot down by Slattery after he had thrown the latter out of his saloon for fighting. Slattery, according to the prosecution, returned with a revolver and leveling it at Mahoney, pulled the trigger, which snapped. Coolly turning the cylinder with an oath, Slattery again aimed at Mahoney, who was crouching behind the bar, and fired the bullet passing thru the bartender's chest. The jury disagreed on the first trial.
