MORE ROOM FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

HOLLAND SCHOOL GETS EIGHT-ROOM ANNEX.

Building Operations to Begin Immediately—School Board Will See That Lower Grade Pupils Go to School Away from Railroad Tracks—Parents Glad to Have Matter Settled.

It is in compliance with a reasonable demand for better school accommodations for the children of the Seventeenth avenue NE, Nineteenth avenue NE and Monroe street districts, that the school board is considering plans to furnish more room. The problem will now be solved in a manner satisfactory to all by building the large annex to the Holland school.

The Holland school is located on Washington street and Seventeenth avenue NE, and has been overcrowded for a long time. The annex will have six large rooms and the plans are such as to allow of an eventual addition of two more rooms, should it be necessary. In connection with the other alterations calling for a thorough remodeling of the school, building operations on the annex will begin at once, but the remodeling of the old schoolhouse will have to be left until the school closes for the summer. Everything is to be finished and in running order when the fall term opens. A new steam heating plant will be put in and the stairs will be widened sufficiently to allow the children to walk up and down four abreast, as at present they can only walk two abreast. There will be many minor improvements. When all the alterations have been made, the Holland school will be one of the largest schools in the city, with from eighteen to twenty school rooms.

It will hereafter be the policy of the school board to assign the smaller children to the school which they can reach without crossing the net of railroad tracks, while the larger boys and girls will be sent to the schools which can be reached only after crossing railroad tracks. While an arrangement of this sort will in some instances necessitate a longer walk for some of the children, their parents feel that there is greater safety in it, even if their walk from home to school means a few extra blocks.

A short time ago parents living in the above-mentioned districts held a meeting and expressed their dissatisfaction with the present arrangements, which made it almost impossible for the smaller children to receive any schooling. The continual growth in Northeast Minneapolis has caused a crowded state of affairs, not only in the public schools, but in the Prescott school, too. At the Hiatt school the average attendance since last fall was about six hundred and seventy-five, while at the Prescott school it was near nine hundred.

NEW PASTOR WAS BORN IN TURKEY

REV. DAVID A. RICHARDSON HAD MANY RARE EXPERIENCES.

He Assumes His New Charge at Bethany Congregational Church Under Excellent Conditions—As Missionaries, He and Mrs. Richardson Witnessed the First Armenian Massacre.

Northeast Minneapolis property owners have placed a petition before the park board requesting to have a bison park laid out on Jackson street and Twenty-second avenue. Twenty years ago a small lake existed in that vicinity. It was then known as "Long John Pond." All that remains of what was once a peaceful small stretch of water is the deep bed, which at the present time is made a general dumping ground for the rubbish and which in the wet season has just a few inches of foul water in it. During the winter time, the northeast young people have been flooding it and utilizing it for a skating rink. It would be an ideal spot for a miniature park and would afford residents the pleasure of going to a charming place for rest and enjoyment during the warm weather, especially the small children and those who are unable to make use of the advantages of the farther-off parks.

In addition to this the park would prove an incentive for prospective dwellers of Northeast Minneapolis and would greatly add to the value in real estate. Last year the eighth ward secured a small park at Lake street and Pleasant do waves, which is similar in situation to the old pond suggested by the residents for a breathing spot.

The block near Jackson street and Twenty-second avenue would lend itself in every particular for just such a park as Elliot park in South Minneapolis, one of the most attractive Minneapolis public parks. It is the only block for a long distance which has not been built up. The total amount of purchase would not be over \$3,000 and the tax per lot would not exceed from 50 to 75 cents, a small sum in comparison with benefit it would offer Jackson street and other residents. Ten years ago the park board planted trees on Polk street from Twenty-second to Twenty-third streets. The result of this improvement has been a beautiful residential street in Northeast Minneapolis and an added increase in value of \$300 on each lot. The small park would do more than anything to raise the value of property west of Central avenue and would certainly be a great boon for the people. Representatives of the John S. Pillsbury estate, which to be taxed, together with almost every prominent landowner, have signed the petition now before the park board.
