**CHISHOLM MINERS JOIN THE STRIKERS**

**Fear of Violence Rather Than Dissatisfaction Causes a Walkout at Several More Mines.**

Duluth, Minn., April 14.—The miners of Chisholm have joined the strike set in motion by men of Hibbing. Between 800 and 900 employed at the Chisholm Pillsbury, Clark, Glen and Monroe-Tenner mines declare they will not return to work while the intimidations continue. The Morrow mine is the only one in operation.

When the striking miners reached Chisholm they were drawn up in company order sixty-one lines of five men each, under four captains. The men were not armed with rifles, tho' it is known many carried revolvers.

Chief of Police McDonald deputized half a dozen men when he learned the strikers were coming, and Sheriff Eates sent a detachment of armed deputies in command of Deputy Sheriff Magie to the Leonard mines. This was at the request of Superintendent William Wearner, who feared an outbreak.

Magie talked with the strikers, and they left after half an hour parley. There was no disorder.

**Satisfied with Pay.**

Seven hundred men are out at the Chisholm Pillsbury, Clark and Glen mines, where the men are earning from \$2.00 to \$4.20 a day for nine hours' work at contract, while ordinary laborers are not paid less than \$2 a day. The men are satisfied with their pay and the conditions. M. H. Godfrey, superintendent of the mines at Chisholm, says he will resume work today if the men return, otherwise operations will be suspended until Monday.

Captain R. J. Mitchell, superintendent of the Monroe-Tenner mine, says that his men are receiving \$2.35 a day for eight hours' work. This, he says, is 10 cents a day more than the strikers are asking.

"The only way we can account for the men abandoning their work," says he, "is that they fear violence at the hands of the strikers. They told me they are satisfied with their pay and hours of work."

**Coroner Jury's Report.**

John L. Agga and Leander Koski came to their death by bullets from firearms in the hands of persons whose identity has not been ascertained, while participating in a riot on the night of April 11," was in substance the verdict returned by the coroner's jury which made an inquiry into the killing of the two Finnish miners at Hibbing.

Twelve witnesses were examined and it was established that the first shots were fired from the strikers' ranks. It is believed that with the burial of Agga and Koski the trouble will be ended.


