NORTHWESTERN NOT ON MARKET

HARRIMAN DOES NOT CONTROL THE BIG SYSTEM.

Director Says W. K. Vanderbilt Is Taking No Chances With Wall Street, and Is Keeping Stock in His Pocket—Man Who Wants the Road Will Have to Pay Vanderbilt's Price.

New York, April 24.—A director of the Chicago & North-Western says: "You may make the statement as strong as you like that the control of Chicago & North-Western is not in the hands of the Rock Island crowd and E. H. Harriman, and is not one of the pawns of Mr. Harriman's game.

"The actual control of Chicago & North-Western rests in the same hands as it did a year ago, and I believe it will stay there. Once the present owners nearly lost it, but that was before the street became accustomed to the ways of the Rock Island crowd and learned that they were daring enough and strong enough to go after anything with a fair chance of getting it. Any one who wants the North-Western now will have to pay for it at the price named by W. K. Vanderbilt—and that price is not little one.

"Chicago & North-Western common is worth \$300 a share of any man's money as permanent investment. Some day it will show 'rights' to its stockholders worth nearly \$100 a share, for that is the 'hidden equity' for which I want to hold my stock. In the meantime, I am content to take my dividends, which yield me nearly 4 per cent."

ELECTRIC LINES MERGER

New System With Connecting Lines to Be Larger in West.

Waterloo, Iowa, April 24.—As the result of the consolidation of the Waterloo, Cedar Falls and Northern railway and the Mason City & Clear Lake Interurban railway, the largest interurban system in Iowa and the entire middle west will result. The consolidation has been decided upon by a meeting of the officers of the two systems held here, and will take place June 1. The concern will be capitalized at \$250,000, and will control when their lines are fully completed over 250 miles of electric interurban railways.

W. E. Brice, president of the Mason City-Clear Lake line, will be president and assistant general manager of the consolidated, while L. S. Cass, president and general manager of the Waterloo, Cedar Falls & Northern, will be vice president and general manager of the new lines. Headquarters will be in this city.

The two systems are to be connected by a stretch of seventy miles of road to be built this summer. The line will leave the northern line of the Waterloo, Cedar Falls & Northern, at Waverly and, traveling northwest, will pass thru Charles City and westerly to "Mason City," where the spur will be built, and the lines of the Waterloo system will be extended from its now northern terminus at Sumner, northeast thru West Union, to Waukon and McGregor. The road will be equipped in the most modern fashion as has been the custom of both roads in the past.

W. C. TO DULUTH

New Line from Owens Will Tap Timber and Ore Lands.

New York, April 24.—The Wisconsin Central management announces that the line north from Owens, Wis., to Duluth thru to Duluth within two years. The new road to be built will be 150 miles long, and will tap a region rich in lumber, and with a fine supply of ore in spots. It will not reach any of the ore lands of the Great Northern which are to be leased to the steel corporation.

The road is intended ultimately to become a trunk line between Chicago and Duluth. It will be about the shortest route in addition to opening up a country rich in local traffic of a heavy nature. Its new country will produce largely lumber for some years, but is stated to be good land enough, once it is cleared.

GETS HURON STREET

Great Northern Wins First Round in Tussle With North-Western.

Huron, S. D., April 24.—At a meeting of the city council Friday night, a petition was presented by the Great Northern Railway company, asking for the right of way from their present right of way west of the city, east along the south side of First street to Dakota avenue. The request was granted, altho Colonel Stewart, representing the Chicago & North-Western, was present and asked that time be given that company to be heard.

It is intimated that there will now be a lively scrap between these two roads as to the coming into the city of the Great Northern by the route chosen, which is in close proximity to the North-Western tracks, offices and depot. There is reason to believe that the Great Northern will begin operations at the corner of First street and Dakota avenue in time to have it ready for use when the proposed extension of the line is completed.

Material for Extensions.

Sioux City, Iowa, April 24.—General Storekeeper W. G. Tubby of the Great Northern railroad announced in Sioux City that he had orders to buy material on hand within thirty days, for the building of 600 miles of railroad, 130 miles of which is to be constructed in Nebraska. The Nebraska construction will consist of the Ashland-Sioux City line, the contract for which has been let to Peter Simms of St. Paul. The remaining material, it is understood, is destined for use in the construction of the Marshal-Hutchinson cut-off in Minnesota.

PEAT FACTORY PROJECT New Enterprise of Importance Is Assured the Ontario Town. Special to The Journal. Fort Frances, Ont., April 24.—Wilson Irwin of Toronto, manager of the Manitoba Peat company, arrived in town last evening, accompanied by Engineer Wilson of the Canadian Northern railway, to lay out the spur track to the Peat company's property to facilitate the handling of machinery and material for the new factory. A gang of men is at work on the siding, which will be 600 feet in length. The machinery for the plant has been purchased and is on the way. The plant is to cost \$50,000, and will give employment to 100 men. As there is no question as to the quality and quantity of material, the company has decided to erect two additional plants as soon as the first one is completed. Mr. Irwin will be the resident manager and has already leased a residence.
