RANGE MURDERER IN THE LAW'S NET

LENCH CHARGED WITH STABBING PETER KOEBERAN.

Fled with an Accomplice and Hid in Northern Swamps in the Day and Lived on Scraps of Food—Boy Takes Long Ride to Notify the Authorities.

Duluth, Minn., May 1.—Sheriff William J. Bates and two deputies yesterday captured Peter Lench, accused of the murder of Peter Koeboran at Eveleth on the night of April 25.

With him was captured Luj Morinek, charged with complicity in the crime. The prisoners were half-dressed when they arrived at the farmhouse of Edward Nelson on the Miller Creek road Saturday night.

Nelson spotted the men as the fugitives from Eveleth. He dispatched a neighbor's boy on horseback, fifteen miles to Albion station on the Mesaba road with a message to Sheriff Bates.

He then stood guard over the suspicious guests with a rifle until Bates and his deputies arrived at 3 o'clock Sunday morning.

Morinek has a knife wound in his side, received, it is supposed, in the fight that ended in the tragedy.



