

McCLEARY'S SON  
SUED FOR SLANDER

S. M. Bear of Sioux Falls After Damages of \$5,000 for a Campaign Circular.

Special to the Journal. Mankato, Minn., May 3.—Leslie McCleary, son of Congressman McCleary, is made defendant in a \$5,000 damage suit brought in the local court today by F. M. Bear of Sioux Falls, S. D., proprietor of the Mankato opera house. The suit is based on a circular issued Nov. 7, signed by the republican congressional committee of the second district and circulated throughout that district. In it is described "the wilfully dishonest and dishonorable business conduct of S. M. Bear in breaking his agreement with the republican congressional and republican county committee for the use of the said opera house."

The opera house was engaged by the committee so that Congressman McCleary might speak there on the Saturday evening before election. Preparations were made for a rousing demonstration, but when the time came there was a play on the boards and the politicians had to look elsewhere for a meeting place. Mr. Bear asserted that the theater trust, of which he is a member, filled the date without his knowledge and he had nothing to do but submit. He says he offered to let Congressman McCleary speak in the opera house Saturday afternoon, on Monday afternoon or evening, but those dates were not acceptable.

While the circular was signed by the republican congressional committee, Mr. Bear was responsible for it, and there names him as the defendant. The papers were served this morning, the plaintiff having waited until the return of Congressman McCleary.

Y. M. C. A. SHUTS  
DOOR TO ACTORS

Pittsburg Organization Guards Its Fold by Rejecting All Stage People.

New York Sun Special Service. Pittsburg, May 3.—The Pittsburg Young Men's Christian association has announced that actors and other members of the theatrical profession, as well as professional athletes and gymnasts, are not wanted as members of the association.

Frank G. Robinson, secretary of the association, reports that during the past week the applications of three actors were rejected. He refuses to give the names of the men who were refused memberships. "The officials have decided," says Secretary Robinson, "that owing to the fact that there are so many young men and boys who frequent our rooms, the presence of stage people is not desirable as they might contaminate the younger members. This does not mean that we are opposed to the stage, but we do not think it advisable to have our young members thrown into contact with the theatrical people."

Rev. S. Edward Young, pastor of the Second Presbyterian church, said today: "I am astonished at the amount of money that is being spent on the theater. There are Christian actors, the same as there are Christians in any other walk of life. If the Y. M. C. A. does not want them, they will always find welcome at my church."

RAINMAKER GETS  
HIS PAY IN WEST

Los Angeles Believes He Has Induced the Skies to Yield Extra Downpour.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 3.—Charles Hatfield, a "rainmaker," who has been working since Dec. 15, to produce eight inches of rain for Southern California by means of a number of Los Angeles merchants to pay him \$1,000 if he succeeded, has completed his demonstration and has been paid a large proportion of the sum promised. The remainder of the amount guaranteed him will be paid shortly.

The fall of rain in Los Angeles during the season ending May 1 has been 18.69 inches, which far exceeds the fall of last season, and is above the normal annual precipitation for this section. Hatfield established his "rainmaking" plant in Alhambra, in the foothills of the mountains, twenty miles from Los Angeles, on Dec. 15, and the amount of rainfall from that date in the immediate locality of his plant has been 26.49 inches. Hatfield's method is a generation of gas and its discharge into the atmosphere from a chimney, which has the result, he asserts, of attracting forces of nature which compel moisture to form and be precipitated in the shape of rain.



Gilbertville, N. Y., May 3.—A thunderous explosion in the Edward P. Brewster bank early this morning aroused the whole village and brought scores of persons to the building, but the most daring robber who has been known to operate in this section in many years calmly stood outside the bank and held the crowd at bay with his pistols while two companions inside caused two more explosions, wrecked a huge vault and an iron safe within it, and came out into plain view with \$2,000 in cash.

The whole robbery was carried out while the villagers were grouped about the bank and the robbers drove out of the village with their booty in a rig stolen for the purpose.

The telegraph operator opened the office and started to telegraph to the towns that lie around Gilbertville. The wires failed to work. The robbers had cut all telephone and telegraph wires.
