WALKER HOLDINGS AUTO POLICE ARE IN CALIFORNIA AFTER SCORCHERS

TIMBER KING DISCUSSES HIS VAST WESTERN POSSESSIONS. AMATEUR "COPS" ENFORCING SPEED REGULATIONS. RESTRICTED ACREAGE IDEA ATTACKED BY TRADE PAPER.

New Railroad, Giving California a Third Eastern Outlet, Will Open Part of His Sugar-Pine Tract for Marketing—Mr. Walker Will Continue to Keep His Residence Here.

Minneapolis is not going to lose the T. B. Walker family and its interests entirely to California. The acknowledged king of the white-pine trade in the pioneer days of the state is fast acquiring the same dignity of title in the California forests, but he will continue to make Minneapolis his home.

"One of my sons has temporarily located in California with his family," Mr. Walker said today, "and perhaps two others, in the course of the next two or three years, may spend a considerable portion of the time in that state. I expect to be there a part of the time in each year during the remainder of my business life."

"So far as my business interests are concerned," said Mr. Walker, "the Western Pacific road will run just below one of the best and largest bodies of timber I own, and one of the best in the world. It will probably cover within twenty-five miles of the timber, and I have small scattered tracts along the road to the railroad."

"There is another railway project talked about for building up the Pitt river, which is really the Sacramento, farm loans to yield 6, 6 1/2 and 6 per cent. Wells & Dickers company, bank floor Guaranty building.

"This latter road runs from San Francisco to Stockton, thence up through Sacramento to Colusa, and on to Orville, thence up the north fork of the Feather river then thru Beckwith Pass, which brings the road near the eastern boundary of the state."

"The people of California are rejoicing greatly that this low grade road, with plenty of money back of it to equip it, is coming into the state. The road already in use is taxed with freight and passengers. The same single track roads of heavy grades and are unable to move the traffic and trade with the state."

DEVELOPMENT OF CALIFORNIA

"Now California is developing quite extensively on some lines, partly in the dividing of the large ranches into farms or fruit lands, and partly in the enlarging and increasing both in agricultural products and mining and handling of merchandise.
