## DEPUTIES LEAVE FIELD TO DIETZ

Officers Made No Attempt to Press the Issue Upon Determined Settler.

Ladysmith, Wis., May 10.—The eleven deputy United States marshals who have been camping in the neighborhood of the Cameron dam for over a week have left for home. They neither tried to arrest Dietz nor went near his premises.

Dietz himself declares that he was never served with an injunction, and gives that as the reason for his failure to appear at Madison on May 1 to show cause why he should not be permanently restrained from interfering with the logging company.

The gates of the dam are wide open, allowing the natural flow of water, which keeps 20,000,000 feet of logs from being sent down and they are rotting. The reports sent out have been greatly exaggerated.

The brother of Dietz admits that negotiations looking to a peaceful settlement have been commenced and that the logging companies themselves took the initiative.

## RAILROADS ASK THAT RATES BE EQUALIZED

### WOODENWARE MAKERS COMPLAIN TO COMMISSION.

East-bound Rate from Pacific Coast Less Than Half the West-bound Rate, Driving Middle West Manufacturers Out of Legitimate Territory—Hannaford Denies that Packers Are Responsible.

Chicago, May 10.—Manufacturers of woodenware in Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota appeared before the interstate commerce commission today and urged an equalization of east-bound and west-bound rates on their products. The rate from the three states named to the Pacific coast is \$1.35 per 100 pounds, while the rate from the Pacific coast to Chicago is only 65 cents. As a result of the freight rates, the woodenware manufacturers on the Pacific coast have been driving all their competitors out of the territory west of the Missouri river.

"When we appealed to the railroads for relief they told us that the beef packers dictated the rate of 65 cents given the Pacific coast manufacturers of woodenware," declared Henry M. Hannaford, Chicago, formerly president of the Two Rivers Manufacturing company. "We couldn't understand the relation between the beef packers and the woodenware makers of the north Pacific coast. Each railroad to which we applied for fair treatment in rates told us that it was not responsible for the discrimination, but simply forced into the arrangement."

James M. Hannaford, vice president in charge of traffic of the Northern Pacific railroad, told the commission that he reduced the rates on bound woodenware at the request of the manufacturers at north Pacific coast points, and that the beef packers had nothing to do with the matter. Mr. Hannaford also declared that his reason for making the east-bound rates less than half as much as the west-bound rates on woodenware was to encourage production in the factories of the north Pacific coast.

### COMMISSIONS ARE OUT

Ticket Agents Not Pleased With the Steamship Arrangement.

Railroads are making complaint that steamship companies will not pay their rightful share of commissions to agents selling steamship tickets from the west. A fight has started, involving commissions paid western agents. An agreement made two weeks ago by the officials of Minneapolis-Chicago lines is effective today, making the railroad commission to agents \$2, the same as has been paid by the steamship companies since the close of the ocean rate war between trans-Atlantic companies. Former commissions were from \$7 to \$8 from both the railroads and the ocean companies. Agents say now that \$4 is too small to meet the expenses of elaborate arrangements for securing business. The railroads admit that the usefulness of the agents in getting ocean summer travel will be weakened, but that the steamship companies have not been doing their part. It is expected that the action of the railway officials will force the steamship men to increase the commission when the railroads may do the same.

### "WEST BOUND" IS HEAVY

Portland Expo Rates Follow the Special Homeseekers' Movement.

More homeseekers than usual in previous years have been brought to the northwest this season on colonists' rates, which cease May 15. Eight days later the round-trip rate to the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland is effective. From that date to Sept. 30 tickets will be sold daily to north Pacific coast points over direct routes by the Burlington system, Canadian Pacific, Great Northern, El Paso, Omaha, Colorado & Southern, Denver & Rio Grande, Colorado Midland, Fort Worth & Dodge Center, Great Northern, Illinois Central, Soo, Missouri, Kansas & Texas, Memphis & Southwestern, St. Louis, Kansas City & Colorado, Union Pacific, Wabash and Wisconsin Central. The Southern Pacific will not join in the sale of tickets daily thru California, but will participate in the excursion rates for such special days as was originally agreed to.

### FAST TIME TO WINNIPEG

Great Northern Expects to Make Sixty Miles an Hour.

Improvement of the Great Northern line northward is expected at Oriskany. A speed of sixty miles an hour, inclusive of stops, is to be made by the Winnipeg train from Minneapolis north, at times bursts of seventy-five miles will be attained, according to report.

An official says the roadbed is to be made the speediest in the country to hold the government mail contract worth from \$150,000 to \$400,000 a year, in which the Soo is also interested. Eighteen inches of gravel from the new pit at Angus will be laid under new eighty-pound rails from Bismarck to Winnipeg. The bed is twenty-seven years old and thoroughly settled. New Shanghai engines have been ordered for the line.

The traffic between the twin cities and the Canadian metropolis is beginning to be regarded as important as that from Minneapolis to Chicago.

### TO MEET TROLLEY RATES

The Illinois Central Reduces Fares to Competitive Points.

The Illinois Central road has announced a reduction of nearly 50 per cent in passenger fares between Chicago and Kankakee, Decatur and Bloomington. The object is to meet the competition of the interurban trolleys. The trains are to consist of an engine and passenger coach, no baggage to be carried, and stops are to be at regular stations, and at cross roads. This is said to be the first move in a plan formed by the big steam railroads managers of the country to fight the trolleys, the Illinois roads having been selected to start the battle. The Alton road already has started competition between Bloomington and St. Louis.

### SUTHERLAND IS OUT

Japanese Company Assumes Work of Directing Pacific Freighters.

George Sutherland, general traffic manager of the Great Northern Steamship company, has resigned. The position has been done away with thru arrangements with the Nippon Yusen Kaisha. That company will act as eastern agents for the Great Northern and the Great Northern railroad will attend to the interests of the Nippon company in America. F. M. Studby, representative of the Seattle line, has been leading the Minnesota cargo delivered to him by the railroad company. W. W. King will continue to man-

Because the cargo of the Minnesota was too valuable to allow it to fall into the hands of the Russian admiral, that steamer will put in at Shanghai, China, instead of Yokohama, Japan.
