CANADA IS LIKELY TO INVADE MAINE

Dire Threats Against an American State Made by Vexed Dominion Government.

New York Sun Special Service.

Washington, May 10.—A novel, not to say, alarming condition of affairs exists on the St. John's river, the stream which flows into Maine and New Brunswick into St. Lawrence river. The Canadian government is threatening to send men into Maine to cut out log booms, which it claims are obstructing the navigation of the river. The threat is one of invasion if there ever was one. The threat was regarded so seriously that Secretary Taft asked Hugh O'Brien, the charge at the British embassy, to call on him today. Taft told him about the obnoxiousness of the Canadian government, and asked him to get Lord Lansdowne to advise the Canadians to do nothing until after Senator Hale has had an opportunity to get his bill passed submitting the question in dispute to a joint commission for settlement.

London to Hear of Case. Mr. O'Brien promised to make representations to the head of the foreign office and to make them strong enough to produce an effect in London, which will be strong in its effect at Ottawa.

The Canadians assert that the log booms divert the waters of the river to such an extent that its navigability is seriously impaired, and at times wholly destroyed. The Americans impound the waters for the purpose of floating logs and in that way deprive the Canadians of the quantity of water they believe they would have in the New Brunswick part of the stream were the logs removed.

The Canadians for several years have been trying to get the question referred to the joint commission appointed five or six years ago for the purpose of considering questions growing out of the navigation of the Great Lakes, and the "streams in the watershed of the St. Lawrence river."

That is the language of the law, but the Americans contend that the purpose of the law was to have commissioners consider merely the effect that a dam at the head of Lake Erie would have upon the harbors of the two countries.

1,000 AT A DOUBLE HANGING.
Bellefonte, Pa., May 10.—Ira Green and William Dillon were hanged here today for the murder of Jerry Condo, strung in the Centre county jail. Fully 1,000 persons witnessed the execution, but were unable to gain admission to the jail.

TAFT SAYS RATE LAW MUST COME

Secretary Warns Railroad Men and Urges Them to Aid, Not Try to Hinder.

Washington, May 10.—Secretary Taft fairly took the breath out of the 300 railway men, members of the International railway congress, dining last night as the guests of the American Railway association, when, after being introduced as "the apostle from the Philippines," he emphatically declared that railway-rate legislation must come, that if the railway men of the country were wise they would aid and not hinder it; that the sentiment of the country is such that failure of proper regulation meant a campaign on the subject that would do no good to the railroads.

Absolute silence reigned as Secretary Taft spoke his mind on the subject of rates. He was positively against government ownership, he said, believing that nothing so deleterious could come to the country as this solution of the question.

Not Like Private Business.
"But," he continued, "you cannot run railroads as you run private business. You must respond to the public demand. If there is danger of discrimination, then you must allow the establishment of some tribunal that will remedy that discrimination." The secretary saw no reason why a

tribunal properly constituted should not be competent in every sense of the word to fix a maximum rate. President Stevenson, Fish of the American Railway association had introduced Secretary Taft. In his capacity as toastmaster Mr. Fish was on his feet the instant the secretary concluded. He answered the secretary at length, taking the view that the law to prevent discrimination, double dealing and secret rebates was ample, and he vigorously called for the enforcement of that law. Mr. Fish talked of the vested rights of the money tied up in railways. He apologized for allowing himself to be diverted, and as he sat down Secretary Taft, who sat next to him, queried in a low tone, "May I have fifteen minutes to reply?" This time was given and the secretary utilized it in making himself even more positive as to his position in favor of legislation which would create a tribunal with authority to name a maximum rate.

What Plan Means.
"The law now is," continued the secretary, "as decided by the supreme court of the United States, that first a commission and then the courts may decide whether a particular rate is reasonable or unreasonable. Now, in fixing that, in the very mental process in determining whether a rate is reasonable or unreasonable, one has got to fix what is a maximum rate. As I understand it, what is proposed is only that in litigated cases a commission shall be constituted that shall fix a maximum rate; in other words, to go through the same process it now goes through to determine what is a reasonable rate. What I am strongly in favor of, tho, is that we shall have a body that shall decide things, and that those things shall be decided within a reasonable time, finally by the courts."

Mr. Fish again took up the argument, contending it was a question of fixing the price for the seller of goods.

More Elastic Rates.
The only phase of the railway question which will come before the congress is that of "slow freight rates," which topic will be presented to the general session of the congress Thursday. The conclusion reached by the section having in charge is that "tariffs should be based on commercial principles, taking into account the special conditions which bear on the commercial value of the services rendered. With the reservation that rates shall be charged without arbitrary discrimination to all shippers alike under like conditions, the making of the rates should, as far as possible, have all the elasticity necessary to permit the development of the traffic and to produce the greatest results to the public and to the railroads themselves."

On the question of length of time on duty and working regulation for employees and laborers, section four of the congress reached the following conclusion for presentation to the general session of the congress: "That due to the many peculiarities of railway service, it is impossible to reconcile the rigidity of the law with the elasticity necessitated by the various requirements by the needs of the public, the employees and employing management. It is held that the employers should have the greatest latitude to fix, under the control of competent authorities, the regulations of work."

Cincinnati, May 10.—Death, due to nicotine poisoning, caused by cigarette smoking, was the record of a certificate filed with the health department by Dr. A. B. Isham. The victim, Charles Weber, Jr., 17 years old, died yesterday.

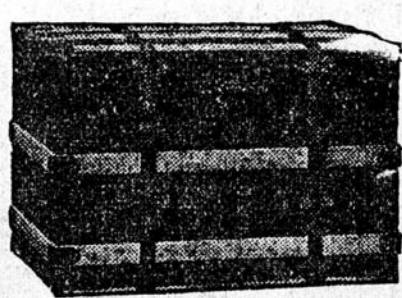

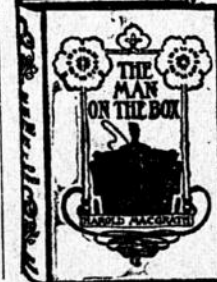

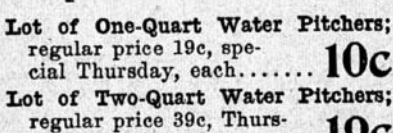
