

NEW LIBRARY OF IOWA COLLEGE AT GRINNELL A GIFT OF CARNEGIE

RED LAKE FALLS

LOSES A POINT

LEGAL DECISION IN THE STRUGGLE FOR A COUNTY SEAT.

Judge Watts Finds that the County Auditor May Not Be Enjoyed from Considering the Petition of Thief River Falls for a Special Election to Vote Upon Removal.

Special to The Journal. Crookston, Minn., May 16.—Judge William Watts today handed down a decision in the famous Red Lake county seat removal case which banks Red Lake Falls citizens in their first attempt to stop the holding of a special election to vote on the question. Red Lake Falls some time ago applied for a temporary injunction restraining the county auditor from considering the petition for removal which had been secured by Thief River Falls men. It also asked for a hearing to show cause why the motion should not be granted. The grounds alleged were irregularities and alleged bribery.

The court holds today that the county auditor's action in this matter is not void and does not disannul the injunction. The judge says that the auditor must wait until the petition is legal or not. He is but a judge of its face, the commissioners being the judges as to its legality.

The county auditor of Red Lake county will now have to call a special meeting of the Red Lake county board to consider the petition for the removal of the county seat to Thief River Falls, and the board will decide whether or not a special election is compulsory. The petition demands one, and unless it can be proven that fraud has been employed in its preparation the special election will have to be called. Red Lake Falls has other moves to make and the end of the controversy is not yet.

Cracker Company's Plans.

Directors of the American Biscuit company, which is to erect one of the largest cracker factories in the west, met today to open bids for the buildings. The plant is to be in the neighborhood of \$30,000 and will be one of the finest in the country.

Organization upon a unique co-operative plan was effected in order to cope with the cracker trust. Merchants of the northwest as far west as Helena have subscribed for stock. Dividends will be paid, not upon the capital stock, but upon the amount of goods purchased by each stockholder during the year.

The Great Northern railway has recently made this a division, and the population of Crookston will be increased about 300 strong by railroad men and their families.

MINERS KILLED

Hewitt Fell Down a Shaft at the Stevenson-Laborer Crushed.

TWO HARBORS, MINN.—John J. Hewitt, who was employed at running a shaft at the Stevenson mine, was killed by falling down the shaft at a distance of more than 100 feet. He was forty-one years of age.

Joseph Diet, an Italian laborer 35 years of age, employed at the mine, was killed by falling into a bucket as it was being lowered. He was working in front of a steam shovel and getting into a bucket as it was being lowered.

COLONY TO HAVE AN ISLAND HOME

FINNS WILL DEVELOP LARGE ISLE OF DRUMMOND.

Anxious to Leave Mining for Agriculture and Fisheries—Miss Wals, a Leader of Her People in the West, at the Head of the Enterprise—Her Career in New World.

Special to The Journal. Hancock, Mich., May 16.—Drummond island, a large island of land at the entrance of the channels leading from Lake Huron to Lake Superior, is to be the home of a Finnish colony. A party of prospective settlers from California, under the guidance of Miss Maggie Wals, has returned from the island where several days were spent on a visit of inspection.

The conditions were found satisfactory, and as a site for the colony a block of territory lying on the south side of the island and one mile from the Lake Huron shore was selected. The land is owned by the government, and already several Finnish farmers have made homestead entries. In every instance the men who have filed are heads of families, and with a few exceptions all are at present engaged in mining.

Their purpose in locating on the island is to engage in agriculture and fishing, the selection of the lands being largely made with reference to carrying out the latter plan. The land is for the most part a clay loam, with black subsoil, and is heavily timbered with giant hardwood trees.

"There are a cement factory, a maple-sugar factory, two schools and two churches, sawmills and postoffices, and a great many other conveniences that we did not expect to find in such an out-of-the-way place. We have made application for a postoffice of our own, and our people will build houses and clear the land the present summer."

Miss Wals' work in connection with the colonization scheme is largely a labor of love. She is remunerated by the government for her services. She acts as adviser for the party, and no action is taken except on her approval. The career of Miss Wals is interesting. During her first six years in the United States she clerked in stores, acted as correspondent for Finnish papers, and magazines, and the person most sought after by Finns out of work in the United States.

In 1887 she returned to Europe and brought back to this country fourteen Finnish girls for whom she had arranged passage and upon arrival here obtained situations for all of them. Desiring to acquire a business education, Miss Wals entered the Northern Indiana normal school in 1892 and completed a two years' course, after which she assumed the duties of treasurer and manager of the Suometar Printing company at Calumet, publishing the Suometar, the oldest Finnish paper in the United States.

That Miss Wals is thrifty is attested by the fact that she recently built a \$40,000 business block at Calumet and holds other realty in the same city. Her business property has taken her in almost every channel of trade, and she has conducted successfully a general dry goods store, a restaurant, a publishing house and real estate agency, all with success. At present she is editor and publisher of the "Helsingin Lehti" magazine in Finnish, which is the only one of the kind in the United States, and one of the only two published in the world.
