"MARK TWAIN" CHEERS INVALID

Writes Letter to Girl Bedridden Since a Trolley Smash Two Years Ago.

Miss Madeline Sinsheimer, the only one of the survivors of the Clifton avenue grade crossing accident two years ago in Newark, in which nine high school pupils were killed, is still an invalid from injuries received at that time.

Some time ago Samuel L. Clemens, known to fame as Mark Twain, became interested in the case of Miss Sinsheimer, and he wrote to her a pleasant letter, in which he said, in part:

"I wish I could take you sound and whole out of your bed and break the legs of those officials and put them in it to stay there. In my spirit I am merciful and would not break the necks and backs, also, as some who have no feel-

ing. May you get well, and soon. Sincerely yours, —S. L. Clemens." During the two years of confinement to her room many friends of Miss Sinsheimer called regularly to see her. To avoid painful farewells, which might excite her so that she would be unfitted for the journey to Philadelphia, no one was told of the plan to take her there. After she had gone this note was found in her room:

"Find Faithful Friends: My going away is so sudden and unexpected that I scarcely know what to do or say; therefore, please don't misjudge me and think me unappreciative and secretive, for the fact is I dread saying goodbye. To one and all I say no goodbye, but 'auf wiedersehen.' —Madeline."

SOUTHERN KANSAS CAN GROW ORANGES

Topeka, Kan., May 19.—Victor Murdock, representative in congress from the eighth Kansas district, says that it will be only a few years until Kansas will produce oranges. "Experiments have been made by the agricultural department," said Mr. Murdock, "which show that a cross between the Florida and the Japanese orange can be grown in this climate. It is now grown as far north as this in the eastern part of the country. I do not believe the orange could be produced successfully in northern Kansas, but in the southern part of the state and in Oklahoma it would be a good crop.
