

HUGE WAREHOUSE IS KNOCKED DOWN

BOXCAR HIT ITS SIDE AND IT COLLAPSED.

Thousands of Tons of Cement Fall with the Wrecking of the Building of the Landers, Morrison & Christianson Company—Teamsters and Horses Have Narrow Escapes.

Torn loose from its trucks, as a trainload of eighteen cars crashed into the "bumper" at the warehouse of the Landers, Morrison & Christianson Company, Plymouth avenue and First street N, a boxcar filled with lime was hurled against the warehouse at 5 o'clock this morning. The building crumpled away and collapsed like an eggshell. Thousands of tons of cement crashed thru the floors with a roar heard for blocks. Dust rose in a dense cloud and for several minutes hid the scene.

If the disaster had occurred five minutes later there would have been seven deaths. As it was, there was no one in the building. Three horses had a remarkable escape. They were standing in a small shed in the middle of the ruins. The shed was the only part of the structure to escape complete demolition and the horses were led out thru the wreckage without a scratch.

The building was about 200 feet long and 60 feet wide. It was a two-story structure, but the only part left to show its height is the office rooms which are lying on their side. The rest of the building is torn and twisted as if a tornado had struck it. The walls on the first street side collapsed outward while the rest of the building fell in. The gravel roof is curled and twisted and is wrapped about the debris and beams. The destruction was so complete that the wreckage lies packed together close to earth.

The building was the property of the Chicago & North-Western railroad and was only recently leased to J. H. Morton, treasurer of the company, today. "We have just completed a brick warehouse across the street and are moving to move the office and next week. Unless rain falls and spoils the Portland cement, the only damage sustained will be to the wagons and office furniture. This will not amount to more than \$1,000 and is covered by property insurance. As fast as the cement is taken out it will be used for delivery, and in two days we will be back to work. The books were rescued the first thing."

A representative of the railroad, who has put to work a wrecking crew of fifty men, said that the railroad company puts no value upon the property, as the building was to be torn down soon. "We might have used it temporarily for a warehouse, but as it is, the destruction came a little too quick, that is all."

The accident is partially laid at the door of the engineer. There were two carloads of what is fine Portland cement and one of quicklime. The train had a good headway on when it struck the "bumper." None of the cars was damaged except the one filled with quicklime. The building was so heavily and evenly loaded that when one part gave way the whole structure collapsed.

LEFT THEIR AGED FATHER A PAUPER

HIS CHILDREN TAKE ANDREW JOHNSON'S LAST PENNY.

Pitiable Plight of Former Minneapolis Man in Seattle—Found in a Squallid Hut Which He Called "Home," the Sad Story of His Life Comes to Light.

From Seattle today comes a pathetic story of the fate of Andrew Johnson, for many years a well-to-do resident of Minneapolis. After the members of his family had taken from his generous hand his savings of years, he was compelled to leave his home because of lack of funds to pay the rent, and found shelter in a squallid hut. His case is described as one of the strangest that has ever come before the Seattle authorities.

Mr. Johnson, who went to Seattle from Minneapolis three years ago, gave all his wealth to his three sons and married daughter, with the understanding that they were to support him thruout his life, then wanting. One by one they moved away, taking the savings of the old man with them, until two years ago, his daughter and her husband departed, leaving him penniless.

Too feeble to work, Mr. Johnson sought out some of the friends of his days of prosperity, and raised enough money to go to Seattle, where he had hoped to find light employment. Soon after his arrival there he was taken ill. This week he was found in a dilapidated, unclean hotel, six feet wide and eight feet long, on the sandspit.

Up to three weeks ago he was able to walk out occasionally, and beg for food in the streets and alleys of the city. In this way he had lived the two years he was in Seattle. When he was unable to leave the hut, he was given a little food by the Indian women in the neighborhood.

Johnson was placed on a stretcher and taken to the Wayside Mission hospital and by board of health ordered his shack burned. At the hospital one of the physicians told him he would never have to live in his hotel again, and that it was to be destroyed. This proved to the old man's mind and he arose from his bed and escaped from the mission. He was not missed until next morning. Then he was found back in the squallid shack. He begged to be permitted to remain there until death should claim him. He was taken away by force and is now an inmate of the county hospital, where he will be guarded while an effort is being made to find some of his heartless children.
