### JUDGE BUCK DIES AT MANKATO HOME

DISTINGUISHED CITIZEN OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Long and Severe Attack of Nervous Prostration Leads to Collapse of Heart's Action—Served Seven Years on the State Supreme Bench and Helped to Found the Mankato Normal.

Mankato, Minn., May 22.—Judge Daniel Buck, former justice of the supreme court, died shortly before noon yesterday after a long illness.

He has not been strong for several years, and spent his winters in the south. He went to Alabama last winter, and while there, in February, was taken with a severe attack of nervous prostration, with which he continued to suffer. He had been failing for several days and Saturday night he was taken with a heart failure which was the immediate cause of his death.

Judge Buck was born at Booneville, N. Y., Sept. 28, 1829, coming of revolutionary stock. He was educated in the common schools of that locality, where he studied law and was admitted to the bar. He came to Minnesota in May, 1857, and was appointed justice of law at South Bend, doing surveying at the same time. In 1868 he removed to Mankato and since resided here.

He was elected to the legislature in 1873 and helped to establish the second state normal school at Mankato, and for that reason was known as "the father of the normal." He was county attorney of Blue Earth county for four years, and in 1878 was elected to the state senate. He served the state and county in various positions, and in 1892 was elected to the supreme bench and served until 1899, when ill health compelled him to resign. In politics he was staunch democrat, striking and commanding presence, unimpeachable integrity and great intellectual capacity. His honesty and straightforwardness in speech for him the title of "The Old Roman."

He recently completed a history of the Indian massacre, which is considered authority on that subject. He was interested in horticultural pursuits and was a successful fruitgrower.

### NORTH LA CROSSE IS UNDER WATER

Steady Rise of River Imperils Operations of Plants in the Manufacturing Districts.

La Crosse, Wis., May 22.—The Mississippi has risen six inches today and two feet in the last three days, and is still rising slightly.

In North La Crosse a large section is under water, people going about in boats where the land is usually dry. Manufacturing industries are greatly inconvenienced and can only be operated with difficulty.

Should the water rise another foot several factories, both on the north and south sides, will be closed.

The country districts are hard hit, large sections, both on the Minnesota and Wisconsin sides of the river, being cut off from market.

The bridge between Onalaska and French Island is under water, preventing communication between the two places.

### \$100,000 BILL OF A PHYSICIAN DISALLOWED

Chicago, May 22.—A claim for \$100,000 for medical service by Dr. L. C. H. E. Zeigler of Chicago against the estate of Harriet McVicker, widow of the theatrical manager, was disallowed today by Judge Cutting of the probate court, who held that the claim was excessive. He instructed Dr. Zeigler to present another of more moderate proportions.

Another claim of \$10,000 under contract was exhibited in court and allowed.

### MOB TRIES TO LYNCH A FATHER AND HIS SONS

Richland Center, Wis., May 22.—A mob of about 1,500 made an attempt to lynch Charles Tyler, and his sons, Roy and Will, accused of assaulting a girl named St. John, who came here from the country and was found in a hay mow twenty-four hours after the outrage. She may die.

Four other men are said to have participated in the assault. The girl was attacked Thursday night and found Friday morning, and it was not until Saturday morning that she recovered consciousness. "If she dies they shall follow her," was the cry of the crowd.

The sheriff made a speech from the steps of the jail, which had a quieting effect on the crowd.

**AMBUSHED IN NORTH CAROLINA.** Salisbury, N. C., May 22.—H. Clay Grubb, acquitted Saturday of the charge of murdering his brother-in-law, was ambushed in a buggy today with a companion, one of his chief witnesses. Both were badly wounded. Grubb recognized one of the ambushers. Fosses of Salisbury and Leadinger are in pursuit.







**VETERAN EDITOR IS DEAD**

Milwaukee, May 22.—William E. Cramer, editor of the Evening Wisconsin of this city, died yesterday of pneumonia. Mr. Cramer was one of the oldest newspaper men in the United States. He was born Oct. 29, 1817. His early work was in the Albany Argus from 1843 to 1846. Among his daily associates were John Van Buren, Silas Wright, John A. Dix, Governor Marcy, Horatio Seymour, Samuel J. Tilden, ex-President Van Buren and others. He came to Milwaukee in 1847. The only political office he ever held was in 1852 when he headed the republican electoral ticket in Wisconsin.

### RAILROADS

## THE N. P. HEADED FOR COAL HARBOR

SYKSTON BRANCH WILL BE EXTENDED WESTWARD.

Contract for Constructing the First Fifteen Miles Has Already Been Let at About \$15,000 a Mile—Residents of Lamont Worried for Fear They Will Be Ignored.

The Northern Pacific has commenced extending its line west from Denhoff, N. D.

The plan is ultimately to extend fifty-four miles to Coal Harbor, on the east shore of the Missouri, in the lignite section. This new strip will cost about \$15,000 a mile, or \$810,000 for the entire extension.

The contract has been let to Donald Grant, the Faribault, Minn., railroad contractor, to build the first fifteen miles. The survey is completed for the entire route, but the remainder of the track will not be built till later. The proposed line goes thru a rolling country and much grading is necessary, making the extension an expensive piece of construction. The Grant contract is to be completed by Aug. 1. A daily train service will then be put in effect on the Sykston branch, which now runs fifty-four miles west to Denhoff. At present a train runs to one end of the branch one day, and returns the next.

There will be townships about every five miles along the line. Just where the stations will be located is a question that is sorely troubling some of the people residing on the line. This is especially the case at Lamont, a new town which has sprung into existence some five or six miles west of Denhoff and surrounded by the richest country along the new route. The owners of a strip of land about two miles from Lamont desire to open their property as a township. They seem to have con-

siderable "pull" with the management, and if they succeed in getting a station established there, Lamont won't get one. Residents of Lamont, in view of the fact that their town now has some twenty buildings, including several stores and a bank, think such action on the part of the railroad would be very unjust. The matter is still pending and has become one of the most important questions to be decided in connection with the new strip of road.

**New Service in the Hills.**

Deadwood, S. D., May 22.—The Burlington and North-Western companies are making preparations to begin daily passenger service between this city and Terry. The matter has been taken up by the Deadwood Business Men's club. There will be a large increase in the business of Deadwood to have this daily passenger service started.

**G. N. to Enter Aberdeen.**

Great Northern agents have completed the purchase of its right of way into Aberdeen at a cost of \$30,000. It is expected that the extension of the line from Pierre to Faulkton will be completed this summer.

**Cheap Rates Bring Thousands.**

Excursions over the Milwaukee, St. Louis, Rock Island and Wisconsin Central roads brought about 5,000 visitors to the city yesterday. Many remained over to do shopping, but the majority returned yesterday. Lake Harriet pavilion was visited by thousands and street cars on the Minneapolis line were run on a very small headway to provide accommodations for those who wanted to attend the ball game or visit the falls.

**WINS CLARK'S GRANDDAUGHTER.**

San Francisco, May 22.—The engagement of Miss Hazel Clark, daughter of W. A. Clark, Jr., and granddaughter of Senator Clark, to Walter Dean O'Brien, son of Thomas V. O'Brien, a well-known attorney of this city, is announced. O'Brien is not more than half way thru the twenties, but has won distinction as a mining engineer and has been successful in the gold fields.
