OSSEO INTERESTED IN MURDER CASE

TRIAL OF ROMA'S SLAYER BEGINS MONDAY.

Nick Eckes, Saloonkeeper at Osseo, Must Answer to Charge of Murder—Village and Countryside Divided in Opinion as to the Outcome of the Case—Points of Law.

Citizens of Osseo and the surrounding country are interested in the trial of Nick Eckes, saloonkeeper at Osseo, charged with the murder of Fred Roma in Eckes' saloon at Osseo, last November.

Everyone in that vicinity who can will attend the trial, which will begin before Judge D. P. Simpson, Monday morning. The accused will be defended by Albert H. Hall and the state's case will be handled by County Attorney Al J. Smith.

The countryside is divided in its opinion. It is admitted by all that Eckes shot and killed Roma. Whether he was justified or not, remains to be proved.

The Eckes faction contend that Roma was quarrelsome, had fought more than one fight on the day of his death and had threatened to kill Eckes. They say that Roma came into the saloon in a threatening manner and made for the defendant who, in self-defense, pulled a gun, shot and killed his would-be assailant.

Some interesting points of law will be raised and it will be a matter of some interest to the lawyers in the county who will attempt to compel the county attorney to call all of the eye-witnesses.
