DR. P. M. HALL RETURNS
HEALTH COMMISSIONER ADDED TO HIS ENTHUSIASM OVER SAND FILTRATION.
Dr. P. M. Hall, health commissioner, has just returned from Washington and Philadelphia, and is more than ever a sand-filtration enthusiast. He attended the American and bacteriological congress, but did not neglect the opportunity to investigate filtration. He said today:
"In Washington they are putting in a sand system at a cost of \$3,000,000. Fourteen million gallons of water are already completed and wonderful results are expected. In both cities the situation is similar to the situation here. Both have to draw their water supply from rivers on which there are large cities."
