RAILROADS OUT OF CONTROVERSY

PRESIDENT ELLIOTT LEAVES DISPUTE AS TO LAMONT, N. D., TO SUBORDINATES.

President Elliott, of the Northern Pacific road, has washed his hands of the Lamont, N. D., station controversy, and referred the whole thing to Thomas Cooper, land commissioner. Mr. Cooper in turn says he will consult with the general manager, the division and chief engineers, and then make a decision. Lamont is a new town containing some twenty buildings, which sprang up on the extension of the Northern Pacific now being built about six miles west from Denbigh. Lamont was established without consultation with the Northern Pacific management, and hence the present controversy. "If men are foolish enough to go into such an enterprise as the establishment of a townsite on a line of railroad without first consulting the railroad officials, they deserve to lose the money they invested," said Mr. Cooper today. "A railroad company always desires to locate depots along its line at nearly equal distances, with due consideration of the surrounding country and general demands for traffic. No road cares to be dictated to by townsite boomers as to where a depot shall be located. The promoters of Lamont named the place after the vice president of the Northern Pacific. Colonel Lamont in return for the courtesy and believing that the new townsite was approved by the company, presented the town with a flagstaff. This presentation the Lamont people have taken as a token of the road's favor. "I have made a personal investigation at Lamont and find there is not a building in the town that cannot be moved to some neighboring town, if we decide a depot shall not be located at Lamont."

Northern Liners' New Rates. The Northern Steamship company's new plan of American rates for passengers taking inside rooms on the steamers Northwest and Northwest is expected to be a "winner" with the traveling public. The new rate in-

cludes passage, berth and meals. The round-trip rate from Duluth to Buffalo first-class is \$30. By adding \$24 to that amount the passenger secures meals and berth. This is practically the same as the Anchor line rate. The one-way fare is \$17.50 European plan and \$23.50 American plan. The Northland sails June 21 from Buffalo and the Northwest June 24.

EASIER FOR TOURISTS Enforcement of Anti-Scalping Law Means Less Red Tape.

General passenger agents of the Western Passenger association lines met yesterday in the Railway building, summer-rate conditions were discussed and it developed that the situation was in good shape. Following adjournment, some satisfaction was expressed personally by railroad men over the progress of the local war on ticket scalpers by the railroads. "This whole movement tends to the advantage of the patrons of the railroads," said one official. "We do not like to annoy passengers with the routine and close questioning they must undergo under the present system of valuing tickets. For instance, our representative has locked up in his safe the tickets of a party of twenty which is here from the southwest on a stop-over. Instead, we should like to do away with all the red-tape methods of inspection and questioning, allowing the passengers to go at once to their hotels from the train and to start from any point they wish without making a trip to the agent's office to get their tickets validated."

WILL TELL STORIES Duluth Meeting of Passenger Men Will Be Purely Social.

Arrangements have been completed for the entertainment at Duluth, June 12, of traveling passenger agents, who regularly visit the head of the lakes towns. It is to be purely a social convention, and has nothing to do with the Western Passenger association convention in July at the same place. W. S. Chadwick, ticket agent at the Duluth union station, conceived the plan. Mr. Chadwick, since November, has been keeping a register of passenger agents who make that territory. The book has assumed large proportions now and is an interesting document of quotations etc. Looking it over, Mr. Chadwick decided to get out invitations for a social convention. These were sent to everyone registered in the book for

the G. A. M. B. A. Y. C. convention. Every traveling passenger agent understands that the characters refer to the opinion of the individual members of the clan to "get as much business as you can." A boulevard drive in the morning will be followed by a boat ride up the St. Louis river to Fund du Lac, where luncheon will be served.

OREDUCED TO ROCK ISLAND Change in Ownership of El Paso Line Causes Speculation.

Los Angeles, June 2.—The Times says: The intention of the Rock Island and to secure a thru line to the coast and a terminal at Los Angeles, is believed by local railway strategists to be at the bottom of the recent mysterious acquisition of the El Paso & Northwestern and its consolidation with their property, the El Paso & Southwestern, by the Phelps-Dodge interests, who are believed simply to be the agents and representatives of the Rock Island in the initiative move on the part of the system to push its way into San Diego and thence to Los Angeles.

WILL BUILD TO DULUTH One Object of Meeting of the Wisconsin & Michigan Railway.

Norway, Mich., June 2.—A call for a special meeting of the stockholders of the Wisconsin & Michigan Railway company, to be held at Marquette, June 12, conveys the information that important extensions are planned. Among the objects of the meeting enumerated is the following: "To purchase or construct a branch railroad from the main line of said company's railroad at Everett, Mich., to the state line at Miscoano island, in the Menominee river; to lease, purchase or construct a railroad from the state line at or near Miscoano island northwesterly, thru the state of Wisconsin, to the city of Superior, Wis. and to the city of Duluth, Minn.; to lease, purchase or construct a railroad from Quinnesec, Mich., to Iron Mountain, Mich., and thence to the state line in the Menominee river westerly from Iron Mountain." It is also proposed to amend the articles of organization so as to increase the capital stock of the company from \$1,500,000 to \$5,000,000; to issue mortgage bonds for corporate and legal purposes and to provide for securing the payment of the same by a mortgage or trust deed on the property which the company now owns, or which it may hereafter acquire. A controlling inter-

est in the company is held by a Chicago banker and associates.

RAILROAD RATES. Winnipeg is reported to be about to realize a hope for a union railway station. It is said that the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern roads will unite with the Northern Pacific in freight and passenger terminals. Prospects for the gold mine along the Fraser river in British Columbia the coming summer are outlined in a circular report to general and traveling agents of the Great Northern road. The news is based on the report of the United States consul at Vancouver. The snowfall has been less than in several years, and the sandbars will be above the river surge, giving a much desired opportunity to investigate the gold-bearing dirt. M. J. Buckley has been appointed general superintendent of the Oregon Railway & Navigation company, to succeed J. P. O'Brien. With the resignation of W. J. Reed, industrial agent of the Great Western, the duties of that office will revert to L. S. Cass, assistant to the general manager.

THAT "BULL FIGHT" The Truth About That Scandalous Affair at Cornell.

Ithaca, N. Y., June 2.—A most absurd and unfortunate account of the "bull fight" in the spring-day festivities at Cornell university has spread over the country. Of course it was a mere burlesque bull fight, but some of the dispatches sent out failed to make this clear, and an impression has gained ground that it was the real article. The animal consisted of the ferocious-looking head and shoulders of the stuffed hide of a Guernsey cow, mounted on a light truck and propelled by a lusty attendant, who projected the bull about the ring rapidly and made it go thru all the performances of a real fighting bull. Two of the matadors were killed—gored to death and run over by the wheels of this terrible animal. This performance was repeated every thirty minutes and the same two matadors were killed frequently with lifelike reality.

SUES CANADIAN PACIFIC

Widow of Conductor Savage Demands Damages for His Death. Special to The Journal. Winnipeg, Man., June 2.—Action has been commenced in the king's bench here by Mrs. Mary Savage, widow of Patrick Savage, a Canadian Pacific conductor, against that company, in which she is claiming damages for the killing of her husband near Tamarac, Ont., on Dec. 21, in a collision between freight and passenger trains. Application was made to the chief justice yesterday to commit Dalton

Coleman, the superintendent's chief clerk, to jail for contempt for refusing to answer questions put to him regarding the accident.
