

Remnant Sale History

Our first remnant sale was started by Mr. J. W. Thomas in 1886, about two years after his co-partnership with E. J. Fales. The method of disposing of remnants previous to that time was that now in practice by many firms—put them on the counter each week or month. There were not enough to cause any stir, and as a rule, after a few of the better remnants were sold, the rest "stayed by" until they became an eye-sore to customers and clerks alike.

Mr. Thomas suggested the having of a general cleaning up at the end of each season, making a real business of it, adding other bargains at odds and ends and broken lines remaining to be disposed of. The first sale of this character was held in December of that year. It proved such a great success that it was repeated the next spring, and so on every six months until the present time—eighteen and one-half years.

The crowds increased with each successive sale, until it became a problem where the goods were coming from to supply the great multitudes of people who came in answer to our advertisements. In the meantime our regular business more than doubled, consequently our resources in remnants and side bargains became greater each year, so that we have managed to more than satisfy our patrons, and Thomas' Remnant Sales have become the most popular events in dry goods circles, the ladies expecting and looking forward to the announcement each spring and fall.

For each sale we engage from one hundred to one hundred and twenty-five extra salespeople, cashiers, bundlers, etc., and the arrangements are commenced weeks in advance, all the arrangements being completed to make the event successful, not only in disposing of merchandise, but also to insure comfort to our patrons, the prompt delivery of goods and all the many details connected with a business of this magnitude.

Next Thursday begins our thirty-seventh sale, and we predict that it will be a rouser. The backward season leaves us with many lines to dispose of, and our piece goods departments report remnants in great plenty. Our old customers fully understand and need no invitation to these sales. To those more bit of history, that they may know something of the beginning and meaning of these greatest of trade events, and we trust many such will come and see for themselves. Our prices range from one-third to one-half of regular prices, in some cases even less. Our goods are of the reliable class and in a variety of lines. More specific particulars being given in the papers of Wednesday next.
